U. S. Supreme Court Session Starts Today in Washington

October Term Commences With Pomp and Dignity. First Decisions Will Be Handed Down October 20 By the Highest Tribunal of the Nation

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 12.—From all the pomp and judicial dignity of the Supreme Court of the United States today met in the grand old hall for the October term. The observance with traditional solemnity of the day that shall mark the beginning of the judicial business of the year was brief. Following the ceremonies and presentation of Solicitor General Davis by Attorney General McKeen, the Justices repaired to the White House and were greeted by President Wilson.

The Justices marched in the procession of the highest tribunal. The chief justice chatted for a moment with the president and passed on Justice McKeen followed, and the remaining Justices formally greeted the chief executive. The more formal greeting preceded an informal exchange of pleasantries between President Wilson and his visitors before the latter returned to the Capitol where work incident to disposing of the heavy October term docket was immediately begun.

The court will meet again tomorrow to hear arguments on the most advanced cases on the docket. A large list of these have been set forward. The first decisions of the October term will be handed down on Monday, October 20th.

BEEF PRICES BECOME FIRM

FLUCTUATIONS WERE A NOTICEABLE FEATURE IN THE SWINE TRADE AT ROSE CITY YARDS LAST WEEK

PORTLAND, Oct. 12.—Beef quotations for last week fell off considerably, and prices were a shade steeper. The bulk of business was transacted Monday and Tuesday, as receipts since then were insignificant.

Swine trade conditions were uncertain and values fluctuated easily. Pops ranged from \$8.70 to \$8.60, with the tendency downward. The outlet is fair for good light hogs and smooth heavyweights, but the size of receipts during the next six days will be the most influential factor on the market.

Sheep-wool transactions gave the impression of a steady to weaker tone on lambs. Some choice yearlings in small lots sold at \$4.50 and prime ones at \$2.75 to \$4. Lambs failed to reach over \$3 at the week's close, but the number offered for sale was so small and quality so ordinary the trade could not settle on a substantial price.

Mrs. Woodruff, Wife of Stricken Bull Moose

Oregon's Farm Crops Valuation Forty Million

(Herald Special Service) CORVALLIS, Oct. 12.—The sum of \$200 for every man, woman and child in Oregon would be their share of the value of the state's agricultural products for the present year, if distributed equally among them. The valuation of farm products is almost \$140,000,000, according to the estimates of Dr. James Withycombe, director of the experiment station, and the population is slightly under 100,000. If the number of farmers in the state is 50,000, perhaps an over-estimate, the average share of the farmer is about \$2,800. The exact valuation placed upon farm crops by Dr. Withycombe is \$74,999,165, and the value of other agricultural products is estimated at \$65,405,599. The grand total is \$139,505,325.

This is almost \$14,000,000 greater than the valuation last year, and indicates great prosperity. The average Oregon farmer seems to be getting beyond the reach of hard times.
