**Chink-Built Trolley Is Now in Operation**

SHANGHAI, Oct. 12.—The first electric car system to be financed, constructed and operated solely by Chinese was opened a few days ago in the native city. By "native city" is meant old Shanghai, or the section under Chinese jurisdiction as distinguished from the international settlement which is controlled by foreign residents.

No foreigner was allowed to subscribe a cent of the \$130,000 or 200,000 taels which was raised to finance the project. All the construction work was done by Chinese contractors, and the management and working staff are all Chinese.

The finished job is eminently satisfactory, in view of the fact that previous to this attempt the Chinese have had no practical experience in such work without foreign direction. The only foreigner connected with the enterprise was E. Kocher, a consulting engineer.

grading and the Pine Flat gradwidened for smoothing and surfacing.

All this has been done with the idea that it will sometime be a part of a great interior artery opening a way to market for a splendid producing country.

Considerable improvement has also been done near Bonanza and on three sides thereof. Several miles between Dairy and Bonanza have been graded, as well as from Bonanza towards Langell Valley. This work was a wonderful improvement and has changed the complexion of that entire vicinity. That between Bonanza and Langell Valley rivals that at Lost River Gap, and is of the same character and provides a way into that magnificent valley which will be as enduring as the surrounding hills.

The most difficult work in this vicinity has been done and the remainder will be easier and less expensive. A few more miles of grade and the highway from Dairy will be complete. This section has the distinction of having the first steel bridge ever erected in Klamath County. It is a splendid structure and will permit twenty-five tons to pass over it in safety. This bridge is 100 feet long and replaces a wooden bridge of 700 feet in length which was 70 years a source of expense.

Some work has been done in Yonna Valley, but more will be done later, or as soon as the main line leading thereto has been suitably improved.

The east side of Langell Valley has been quite well provided for, but the west side still needs improvement. A road is sorely needed across the valley at some convenient location, since residents on either side must travel miles out of their way to get across. Since the mail road has been changed from Bonanza outward toward Bly, it seems to suggest an improvement of the Reservation road to Bly. This can be done on less grade and expense than the former route. A moderate sum will provide for this construction and a first class road can be built.

Much work has been done around Bly. This country never had any passable road before the present administration, and one of the first acts of the present court was to build a road through one of the largest ranches near Bly so that numerous residents living on the other side of Sprague River source could get to town without making a detour of eight miles or swimming their horses.

The "Devil's Garden" is the worst proposition in the Bly country. It always has been expensive and will be until some permanent change is made. Luckily, however,
