THOSE APPROPRIATIONS

JUST a word regarding the appropriations made by the legislature for a new building and betterments at the University of Oregon.

No one has questioned the need for the appropriation. Even those behind the referendum admit the need. The board of regents, Governor West and others have set forth the case in the voters' pamphlet.

The legislature passed the bills almost unanimously, when they had investigated the matter. Their action was based upon conditions existing last school year; they are more pronounced now.

The school year has just opened at the university, with the largest freshman class in its history. Temporary buildings of rough lumber are being erected so that the students may be put under cover and class work carried on. Such temporary quarters are not economical.

The funds of the university, amounting in all to \$175,000, will not require an additional tax, but are provided for in the levy already made. The cost to the man who pays taxes on \$1,000 will be about 18 cents, and to him who pays on \$100 a little less than the cost of a postage stamp.

Would Enlarge Plant

H. G. Butterfield submitted a petition to the council asking for a \$25,000 bond issue to build an auxiliary electric light plant at the lower intake to cost \$166,000. This was asked because the present system has reached its limit, and can take no more customers. It was stated that this step would increase the present power 60 per cent now, and would eventually increase it 100 per cent. The communication was referred to the council as a committee of the whole, meeting to be subject to the call of the mayor.—Ashland Record.

While in Klamath Falls on business, H. G. Hussey was taken seriously ill. His family was notified and went to him immediately. At last report his condition was somewhat improved.

On last Saturday evening the ranch house on the James Lindsey place was entirely destroyed by fire. The place has just been purchased by Mr. Bealer, and this will undoubtedly be a hard blow, as nothing was saved whatever, and even the winter's supply of groceries was lost. Among other things burned was considerable fine embroidery and china from Japan and Honolulu, as Mr. and Mrs. Bealer have spent some time teaching in the latter place, and had many valuable souvenirs. There was no insurance.

The work of putting the Langell Valley telephone lines in good shape has been begun in the last few days. It is expected that a good electrician will be employed to complete the work begun.

School at the Lorella school house will be discontinued this week to permit Miss Auburg, the teacher, to attend the County Institute.

The tugboat Gatun carried Mrs.

George R. Goethals, wife of the man who has had more to do with the success of the Panama canal than any one else, through the Gatun locks after the water had been turned into them. The Gatun was the first boat raised in the Gatun locks, and this was done September 25th.

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WILL WAGE WAR ON PINE PESTS

GOVERNMENT, STATE AND PRIVATE PARTIES WILL UNITE TO ERADICATE THE PINE TREE BEETLE

Representatives of the United States government, the state of Oregon and the big private timber owners of Klamath and Lake counties will unite in a supreme effort to save the billions of feet of fine yellow pine of this section, which is being seriously threatened with destruction by the ravages of the pine beetle.

W. E. Glendinning of the bureau of entomology, J. F. Kimball of the Klamath-Lake Counties Forest Fire Protective Association, and Charles C. Chittwood, supervising fire warden at the state, left today for Bear Flat, near Silver Lake, in the Paulina forest reserve, where fire is to be resorted to in an effort to stop the spread of the beetle infestation.

It has been discovered that in one section of the Paulina reserve the pine beetle is particularly flourishing, and it is the opinion of experts that if not destroyed immediately they will spread to the adjoining forests of fine yellow pine and cause millions of dollars damage. A section of about ten miles square is to be burned, but as this tract is mostly covered with inferior jack pine, the loss in timber will not be heavy. This loss, however, will be as nothing if it should result in stopping the spread of the beetle to the more valuable surrounding timber.

"Laying aside the loss to the private timber owners as well as the government timber on the reserve, very few realize what the infestation of the forests by the pine beetle would mean to the state of Oregon and the laboring class," said J. F. Kimball, local representative of the

Weyerhaeuser company. "We figure that the manufacture of every thousand feet of this timber means \$8 in wages to the laboring man. Its destruction will mean millions of dollars loss that would eventually be paid out in wages."

There are 300,000 acres of valuable timber in private ownership near the Paulina reserve. The largest owners are the Gilchrist holdings of about 150,000 acres; Shevlin & Carpenter, of 50,000 acres, and Weyerhaeuser Timber company, of over 50,000 acres. All this will average between 12,000 and 14,000 feet to the acre, or a total of over 300,000,000 feet. It will cost about \$2,400,000,000 to manufacture this into lumber ready for market, and this vast amount will be lost in wages to this section if the efforts of these men are not successful in stopping the spread of the dreaded pine beetle.

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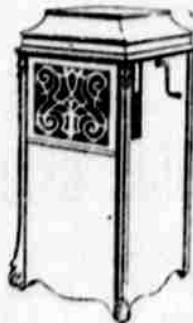

Paris Says Japanese Are Behind Mexicans

PARIS, Oct. 14. That Japan is backing Mexico in her belligerent attitude towards the United States, and that the latter country is "afraid of Mexico" are some of the intimations constantly finding expression here.

"The Stars and Stripes triumphed over Spain in Cuba a few years ago," Alcance declared in "La Patrie," "but to look Mexico would be a horse of another color. Dollars don't count, officers and men are necessary, and those the United States haven't got. To think of even matching Mexico much less conquering her, under present conditions, would be pure folly, especially if what is said be true, that Japan stands back of Mexico."

Americans living in Paris find it hard to understand the attitude of the French Press on the American policy in Mexico, unless they accept the explanation given by the Mexican constitutionalists here, who assert that the Huerta government has spent \$200,000 to create in the newspapers anti-American articles. They point out that Japan had the sympathy of Europe when she immediately threatened war on China because three Japanese were killed at Nanking in the clash between government troops and rebels, yet Americans have been insulted, killed and mistreated all over

Mexico. Mustlin, editor of "The Mexican Revolution" quoted here as the organ of the constitutionalists, told the correspondent: "It is only fair to say that President Wilson has shown remarkable forbearance. Had Mexico been in Europe the great powers of the old world would have intervened long ago." Says the "Echo de Paris," one of the most ardent of the French morning papers:

President Wilson has declared that he is unalterably opposed to any government irregularly established by ambitious politicians. Why has the new president so declared himself? His declaration really means that Mexico is to be turned over to anarchy as she is to suffer from the unfriendliness of the United States. Is President Wilson merely ignorant of American conditions? On the part of the Secretary of State, M. Bryan, all the ignorances are possible.

"All hypotheses are permissible, but this is certain. All roads in the United States lead to intervention. Stronger than the words of politicians is an irresistible force (including the United States) towards the absorption of Mexico and Central America."
