PRESIDENT OF NEWEST REPUBLIC

A CLOSE RANGE VIEW OF YUAN SHIH KAI

He Is One of the Strongest Men of the New Generation

PEKING, China, Oct. 14.—Yuan Shih Kai, just elected as the first permanent president of China, has been the first provisional president since March 19, 1912. Contrary to the general opinion, Mr. Sun Yat Sen, to whom perhaps the greatest credit is due for the revolution which overthrew the Manchus in 1911, was never provisional president of the Chinese republic. When the revolution broke out at Wuchang on October 10, 1911, Mr. Sun Yat Sen was in Europe. He hurried to China and on January 1, 1912, he was installed at Nanking as provisional president of the so-called "government" which the rebels had set up. At that time the Manchu emperor was still the legal ruler of China. He abdicated on February 12, the eldest of his sons, the Empress Dowager, direct-

ly by way of the Hanlin Academy, and chose the life of a soldier after taking his provincial R. A. As the soldier in the old days ranked below all grades of society except the merchant and the actor, his rise is all the more remarkable. He is essentially a self-made man.

Yuan Shih Kai was born fifty-four years ago in Honan province, Central China. Thus, he is not a North Chinese, as has been said so repeatedly in the foreign press. Another erroneous impression in regard to Yuan, the "Washington of China," is that he is of a noble family. His family has been of the Honan gentry for many generations, and his uncle, a general of the old Manchu army, but they were not noblemen. The scholarship has been the only sure key to preferment in Chinese politics. Yuan rejected the easy path

by way of the Hanlin Academy, and chose the life of a soldier after taking his provincial R. A. As the soldier in the old days ranked below all grades of society except the merchant and the actor, his rise is all the more remarkable. He is essentially a self-made man.

Yuan Shih Kai's public career began in 1882, when 23 years of age, with his assignment to Korea. Three years later he became Chinese imperial resident. He held that position for nine years and was driven



out by the war with Japan. He has held many other positions under the Manchus.

When the outbreak at Yuchang on October 10, 1911, started the world and struck terror to the hearts of the Manchus, Yuan Shih Kai was leading the quiet life of a Honan gentleman farmer. The army that he had trained, the first corps of Chinese soldiers that ever got their full pay on pay day, was in the hands of others, but the spirit of the corps was with its old commander and benefactor. The Manchu emperor and his mother sent out three distress signals to Yuan Shih Kai before he responded. He was made viceroy over the disaffected provinces, with full command of the land and naval forces. Soon thereafter he was summoned to Peking and appointed prime minister to succeed the notorious, corrupt and reactionary Prince Regent, Prince Chun, who had dismissed him two years before.

An unsuccessful attempt to assassinate Yuan was made in the streets of Peking on January 15, 1912. The bomb, thrown from a roof, killed a member of his bodyguard. Yuan continued to smoke a cigarette throughout the ordeal. Three times he was offered the rank of marquis tendered him by the imperial family the month before their abdication. He opposed both the Manchus and the radical republicans. Yet the Manchus leaned upon him in their last days, and the republicans accepted him as their first president. The reason was that he was, and still is, the strongest man in China, as the foreign governments have considered him since 1900.

OPERATION MAKES OVER A CRIMINAL

OPERATION TO RELIEVE PRES-

CANYON CITY, Colo., Oct. 14.—From a habitual criminal, showing at times tendencies to violent insanity, Jeff Lee, a prisoner at the penitentiary here, has been transformed into a quiet, gentle man, perfectly sane. The skill of the surgeon has made Jeff Lee a new man. Recently his skull was trephined and a pressure on the brain removed. As a result, Warren Tynan today announced that his cure had been effected.

Until the operation half of Lee's 20 years had been replete with criminal acts and periods of insanity. He went to the penitentiary in December, 1912 to serve from two to five years for burglary and grand larceny. He was sullen and mean; he constantly defied the warden and ignored the prison rules.

Says Prisoners Have Best Chance to Learn

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 14.—Conditions are more favorable for educational work in penitentiaries and other penal institutions and reformatories than they are in the public schools of the country, according to Prof. Bert E. Merriam, psychologist and educational director of the New Jersey Reformatory at Rahway, N. J., who today addressed the American Prison Association in annual convention here. Prof. Merriam startled the association with this assertion when he was pointing out that educational work in penal institutions should be productive of great success provided the proper system is followed.

"Inmates of penal institutions," said Prof. Merriam, "are better clothed, better fed and better housed

than pupils of our public schools. They have not the worry and drain which poverty at home means. Officers may be sharp; discipline may seem severe, but the thoughtless blows and whippings given by drunken fathers and mothers at home are far worse. In New York City alone many thousand pupils go to school every session, especially the morning ones, having had nothing more than a cup of coffee for their meal. Inmates of penal institutions are regularly fed substantial meals; they are warmly clad; they get wholesome exercise; they sleep regularly; they are kept physically clean. Can this be said of the myriads of East Side children and countless thousands who live in similar "East Sides" of others of our great cities?

Brookline, Mass., said to be the richest town in the world, per capita, does not permit moving pictures. The children of wealthy parents must find other amusement. They know nothing of the delights of the "movies."
