A GOOD START

OF COURSE the members of the
city council do not expect any-
thing but criticism. They have be-
come used to this, as all public offi-
cials must, sooner or later. If you
are not too extravagant, however, a
little praise once in a long while will
help to break the monotony.

The council took a step in the right
direction when it authorized the se-
curing of a location and the erection
of hitching racks for teams from the
country. The city already owns prop-
erty very suitable for this purpose,
and it is a wonder that it has not
been put into use before.

Heretofore when a farmer came to
town to purchase supplies he had to
tie his team to a telephone post and
have a policeman come around and
tell him he would have to move, or
else he would have to go to the ex-
pense of putting his team into a liv-
erly stable for the few hours he was
in the city. Naturally neither of these
experiences made him very friendly
to the city, and as a result his visits
were made only as a necessity.

Now that the city has made the
start by supplying the farmers with
hitching racks, maybe, in the course
of time, they will supply sheds, and
eventually a public market to make it
convenient and possible for the farmer
to dispose of his products. Who
knows?

"ROUND-UP" OF DOGS

A COMMERCIAL MAN, who has
been spending several days at
the Hotel Hall, has written a com-
munication to the Herald, comment-
ing on the unfavorable impression
left on the visitor caused by the
hordes of dogs permitted to run loose
on the streets of the city.

Commercial salesmen, traveling
from city to city, are quick to notice
and compare the advantages and dis-
advantages of the cities they visit,
and as a result make the most effec-
tive boosters that a city can secure.
On the other hand, if there is any-
thing wrong with a town the facts are
just as freely circulated among those
with whom they come in contact, and
the booster is turned into a knocker.

There is much truth in the state-
ment: "If you want to know any-
thing about a town ask the salesman
on the road." It might be well for
Klamath Falls to follow the sugges-
tions made in the following letter:

"During the past three years I have
made several visits to your city, and
have been impressed with the rapid
growth and the many improvements
that have been made during that
time. It is evident the affairs of the
city are in able hands, and I cannot
understand why you tolerate a nu-
isance that is both dangerous and em-
barrassing, especially to women. I
refer to the fact that your city is
overrun with dogs. Today, as on
former occasions, I saw at least a doc-
zen dogs playing or fighting on your
main street, and I saw a woman al-
most knocked down by a large dog
in pursuit of another. I have never
seen this condition in any other town
of this size. I cannot think of any
improvement that would benefit your
city more at present than to have a
big 'round-up' of dogs."

Would Have a Re-Survey

E. G. Hopson, supervising engineer,
publishes a letter in the Bieber Ga-
zette suggesting that Modoc and Lan-
sen counties raise a sum of \$2,500 for
a re-survey of the various irrigation
projects within these counties, pro-
vided the interior department appro-
priate a like sum. The counties of
Colusa, Glenn and Tehama have ap-
propriated sufficient funds to insure a
re-survey of the Iron Canyon project,
and the work will begin at once. Mr.
Hopson states that a larger sum than
\$5,000 might lead to extravagance,
and we think he is about right. The
matter has not come before the board
of supervisors of this county, and it
is problematical what action they will
take, if any.—Alturas Plaindealer.

Would Raise Eyegore

Mayor Johnson brought before the
city council the matter of the partly
dismantled opera house building at
the corner of Main street and First
avenue. Mayor Johnson said that the
cellar is filled with a mass of rotting
boards and other material, and that
he believed the owner should be com-

DR. HODGE IN GREAT DEMAND

UNIVERSITY MAN WHO WILL
LECTURE TOMORROW AND FRI-
DAY NIGHTS, IS AT THE SERV-
ICE OF THE PUBLIC

(Herald Special Service)

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eu-
gene, Oct. 15.—A man who tells the
children—and the grown-ups, too—
the secrets of the toad, the birds, the
mosquito, the housefly and of some of
the untamed animal creatures that
are familiar sights on Oregon farms
or in Oregon woods, is Dr. Clifton
Fremont Hodge, the eminent biolo-
gist, whose services are this year at
the disposal of towns and villages of
the state.

Dr. Hodge is for one year at least
on the faculty of the University of
Oregon. His services are free to the
community; they are part of the uni-
versity's extension department in-
struction through the state.

Dr. Hodge does not tell the animal
and bird and insect secrets of Oregon
merely to entertain, although his
talks are pronounced most entertain-
ing; he does it to teach. From him
the children learn which bird is ben-
eficial and should be protected to the
utmost for the sake of Oregon crops.

They are told which of the insects
should be most feared and how such
insects should be fought. He tells
them what to expect from the small
animals, which ones can be domesti-
cated and how to do it. Then he
goes further, in other lectures, and
teaches the saving and planting of
tree seeds, and of bacteria, of com-
mon sense cleanliness and of the
fungi of household garden and field.

Dr. Hodge will be at Klamath Falls
tomorrow and Friday.
One object of Dr. Hodge's work is
to bring the boys and girls closer to
the farm, with a view of keeping
them there. There is also the view-
point that practical teaching in town
and farm biology means saving mon-
ey for the city dweller and increased
receipts for the soil tiller.

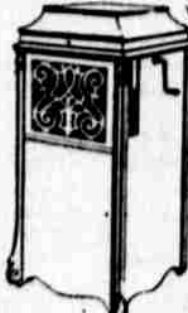

MEDFORD, Oct. 15.—From pres-
ent indications there will be about
20,000 people in Medford November
17, when the Giants and White Sox
look up for their only game in Ore-
gon. Klamath Falls is coming strong.
Reservations have been asked for
from Central Point, Gold Hill, Rogue
River, Hill, Dunsmuir, Shasta Springs,
Grants Pass and Roseburg, and with
Medford's 10,000 strong, every vac-
ant space in Court Hall's ball park
will be filled, and then some.

If the present demand for seats
continue, Bobby Brevard announces
he will have bleachers built around
two sides of the field and up to the
grand stand, so there will be no trou-
ble about accommodations. As the
grand stand will hold only about 600,
those who want comfortable seats and
a roof over their heads are advised to
secure their tickets at once.

A. S. Rosenbaum had the honor of
buying the first six tickets, but they
are going fast. The University Club
will have a reservation of 100 seats at
the game, and the Commercial Club
has ordered some stickers for pack-
ages and letters informing the world
of the big doing in Medford next
month.

twirler who received an auto the oth-
er day for being the most valuable

man in the American league, will be
with the White Sox, and will show
his prowess for three innings in Med-
