PUBLIC ENTITLED TO KNOW

WE BELIEVE that the people of Klamath Falls are entitled to know whether they are being served with pure or impure water.

It appears that several tests have been made of the water which the citizens of Klamath Falls are compelled to drink. It is claimed that the results of the tests do not agree, but as far as the thousands of people of the city, who are daily using the water, are concerned they are unable to know whether they are drinking poison or not.

Several weeks after the reports of the tests were received a member of the council secured the analysis and embodied it in a report to the council, and as far as known the question of the purity of the water is still in doubt. In the meantime there have been several cases of typhoid fever. Whether these were caused by typhoid germs in the water is publicly unknown.

The health and lives of the citizens should be of more importance than any other consideration, and it is the duty of the officials who are paid to protect the health of the city, to at least make known to the public the facts in the case. If these facts are not known, then it is up to the city to secure them.

We cannot understand why the people should be so utterly ignored in this matter. It is their lives that are at stake. Since the question of the purity of the water was raised by the report to the council, many of the citizens have gone to considerable trouble in protecting themselves by boiling all water used for drinking. If there is no necessity for this the people should know it. On the other hand, if there is any question, then it is the duty of the health officer or other official to immediately warn the people, so that they may take the necessary precautionary measures for the protection of themselves and families.

In any event, we cannot see any necessity for keeping the matter a secret.

UP TO THE WOMEN

ON NOVEMBER 4 will be the first time that the women of Oregon will vote at a state election.

A great fight has been made for woman's suffrage in the state, and a great fight is now being waged in other states to secure the ballot for women. The question now before the public is, will the women of Oregon take advantage of their great victory? So far, the women have been very slow in qualifying themselves for the coming election by registering.

Only three more days remain in which to register, as the books close on the 20th. It would seem that the matter of pride alone would be incentive enough to induce the ladies to get their names on the registration books.

However, there is another very vital reason why the women should qualify themselves so that they will be enabled to vote on November 4. On that day will be decided the fate of the University of Oregon. The men voters have paid a very high compliment to the women by conceding that as a matter of course, the women will be found on the side of education. The friends of the university are depending on the women at the coming election.

Declares We All Show Some Criminal Traits

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 16.—If a criminal expert looked you over, studied you and rendered his decision declaring that you have many characteristics, attributes and habits of a criminal, you'd probably "hit the ceiling," but according to a classification of criminals given today before the American Prison Congress, it would appear that there are mighty few people but what have "criminal characteristics."

Dr. Prehn, who spoke at the closing sessions of the congress today on "The Mental Factor in Crime," is surgeon of the Dominion penitentiary at Kingston, Ontario. He has studied classification of criminals, and criminal tendencies specially, and is noted as one of the most famous experts in the world along these lines. His classifications, therefore, should be intensely interesting. He enumerated nine classes, as follows:

Criminal from adventure who started from reading "penny novels"—not necessarily bad; criminal from weak mentality—not insane, but those whose mentality is not up to the normal—to this class belongs degenerate; insane criminal, who has

irresistible impulses to commit notoriously anti-social acts; accidental criminal, or "criminal by passion"—generally a man of good reputation, who, owing to peculiar sensitiveness attempts life or seeks revenge; incorrigible criminal—morally depraved or completely unmoral—beyond any possible hope of improvement; habitual criminal—generally intelligent—forms fully 50 per cent of all prisoners; occasional criminal, who yields to some sudden temptation—usually manifests marked instability of character; professional criminal, who represents aristocracy of criminal world—generally heartless and lacking in pity; instinctive criminal—moral monster devoid of social guiding instincts—commits crime for the love of it.
