ITALIAN WRITES ON CURRENCY

Says a Central Bank Is a Necessity Is Set Against Bankers Having Power of Directing

ROME, Oct. 16.—That a permanent and successful currency reform in the United States can only be effected by the establishment of a central bank of control—not, however, under the direction of bankers, as advocated by former Senator Aldrich—is the belief of Luigi Luzzatti, former minister of Italian finances, former prime minister of Italy, and who recently refused the post of financial adviser to the new Chinese republic. In an article prepared by him for the United Press he today gives his views on the proposed legislation in the United States, as follows:

There has already been noted the clamor with which the Americans of the United States decided upon some time ago and completed their investigation of the question of banks of issue for the purpose of reforming their present inadequate currency system.

At that time all Europe was leaping upon information and Italy's contribution was competently made by Senator Luzzatti. I did not at that time make any comment, not because of lack of courtesy, but merely because I was then at the head of the government. Now, I must admit, I am not sorry I kept silent. In fact, the proposed laws for the reform of the currency in the United States, which have followed the investigation into the question of banks of issue, appear to me most strange. It is not, indeed, to be wondered at that no one, not even President Wilson, is satisfied with them.

In the first place, I believe, former Senator Aldrich, who was the moving genius of the currency investigation, wished to create a single central bank administered by bankers. His plan was open to many criticisms, both in substance and in form, but the idea, however, of a single central bank is unquestionably the right one. Now, I believe, the latest proposed law would furnish a bank note cur-

rency, created by the national government, to twelve different authorized banks of issue or emission, which in turn would secure the bank notes to the national government by commercial paper and which would maintain a guarantee reserve fund of 33 1/2 per cent of gold or other legal money. This certainly is a more exact conception of good banking rules, the issuing of bank currency on commercial paper and the guaranteeing in part of the currency thus issued by a reserve fund of gold or other legal money. In this way is ended the persistence in the old times of error of covering the bank currency with government bonds. It is in fact merely the adoption of the new system which has already been generally in vogue in Europe for some time past, and which the United States alone has been slow to adopt.

However, leaving to one side the considerations aroused by the twelve banks of emission, which is opposed to the present day tendency of uniting the only tendency, as is to be seen in Switzerland, that is capable of regulating opportunely the currency, the slight exchange, the inward and outward flow of gold—who is going to decide upon the severity of the discounting of the commercial paper? Either in one way or another the state will take a hand and politics

will thus enter in, discrediting the responsibility of the bank, or each individual administration of the twelve different standards of discounting, either severe or lax (according to the competition of other banks, a spirit of absolute rigidity, etc., etc.) which will determine the soundness of the bank currency in circulation. In which case the doubts thus created will react in moments of financial crisis on the banks of emission themselves, thus aggravating the condition of the industrial markets.

In fact the grand studies which have been made by the United States upon the currency question have up to the present moment resulted only in grand confusion and the United States has failed to have the courage shown by another sister republic—that of Switzerland, which also had several banks of emission, in the different cantons, as at Geneva and elsewhere, and which, after many quiet investigations, with the usual Swiss way of doing things, finished with instituting a single central bank of state. This approach the highest type of the German Empire, which, holding on to the vital forces of the old institutions, enjoys a happy autonomy, succeeds in guaranteeing perfectly its bank notes and above all serves the national circulation instead of making the national circulation serve it, thus improving the

Biggest Warship Goes Into the Waters Today

PORTSMOUTH, England, Oct. 16.—The costliest, speediest, most powerful super-dreadnought in the world, the "Queen Elizabeth," was launched at the royal dockyard here today, the naming ceremony being performed by Lady Meux, wife of Admiral Sir Rodworth Meux, commander-in-chief of the Portsmouth naval station.

The Queen Elizabeth and her four sister ships now under construction comprise the very latest word in battleship building. Each will cost, when completed, \$11,750,000, will have a speed of 25 knots an hour, and will be provided with ten 15-inch guns capable of throwing a broadside fire of 15,600 pounds.

They will burn no coal whatever, relying upon fuel entirely from oil, which will be stored between the outer and inner skins. Each will carry more than a million gallons of oil.

The guns will have an extreme range of twenty-two miles, and experts say they will be able to penetrate the thickest armor yet made at a range 50 per cent greater than that

at which any naval action is likely to be fought.

The enormous advance in warship construction as represented by these vessels is indicated by the fact that the original Dreadnought, completed only seven years ago, had a broadside limit of only 6,800 pounds. The big increase in both offensive and defensive armament was made possible by the substitution of oil for coal, which thus provided great economy in both weight and space.

The Italian army has adopted a "cruiser of the desert," an armored automobile carrying seven men and two guns, one on top in a revolving turret.
