THE OUTLOOK

THE entrance of the Japanese into
the potato growing industry in
Klamath county, rather than result-
ing in overstocking the local market,
has attracted the attention of the big
buyers of the coast to this section,
and there will be no trouble in dis-
posing of the entire potato crop of
the county at a higher price than has
been usual.

Wheat and grain buyers are also
being attracted to Klamath county,
and the farmers this year are experi-
encing the pleasing sensation of com-
petition for the purchase of their
grain. In addition to Martin Bros.,
the local buyers, a large San Fran-
cisco firm has had a buyer in the field
since the beginning of harvesting.

Recently a representative of the
Guthrie-Balfour company, one of the
largest shipping firms on the coast,
arrived in the county for the purpose
of buying wheat.

All of which goes to show that
Klamath county products are becom-
ing known to the world, and as a re-
sult the farmers will be able to se-
cure the best market price in real
cash for everything they can grow.

OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"The Cain and Christ Spirit"

Not as Cain, who was of that
wicked one, and slew his brother, . . .
because his own works were evil, and
his brother's righteous. —1 John,
2:12.

Mother Eve, no doubt, thought this
son to be the promised Redeemer,
but she was deceived. Nevertheless
she was the mother of Cain, and we
are his brothers. We cannot disown
him. Like smaller brothers, we have
been copying and drinking in his
spirit instead of setting up the Spirit
of Love that attracts to Christ. But
let us rejoice that amid the centuries
another brother has arisen, who is
the Light and the Life of men. This
kinship writes Salvation, instead of
murder, over the door of the heart.

The elevator of human history fell
with a crash when man became a sin-
ner. Adam was in the elevator, and
the splinters wounded Cain, and since
then, the human race. Adam sinned
against God, Cain against man; Adam
blamed Eve, Cain pleaded ignorance;
Adam was a rebel, while Cain was a
murderer.

Let us not study the act, but the
spirit of our brother, Cain, which
was murderous. Some of the repre-
sentatives of this spirit let us term:
anger without cause, heartless com-
petition, malice, wrath, looked re-
proach and an unforgiving spirit. The
drooping arms of Cain form on either
side of the watershed of the human
race. Had he only raised his right
hand to God, and with the other
reached down to his brother, the
Peace Song of the angels might have
been sung centuries sooner.

The Cain spirit is self-asserting
and independent. This any devil can
do, but it took one as great as the
Son of God to become a servant and
lay down his life for his fellowmen.

The natural man as pictured in the
New Testament "savored the things
of man and not of God." He is an
unsacrificial being that shrinks from
going to his Calvary. This spirit
caused ancient monarchs to build
their thrones on the sufferings of
others. As we neglect to take our
cross and follow Christ we lose the
secret of all mercies ever shown
needs rebels, for victory is either lost
or gained by the sacrificial spirit.

Man without Christ is given to
mingle religion and worldliness.
When Jesus said: "Ye cannot serve
two masters." . . . immediately
the Pharisees who were lovers of
money . . . scoffed at him. When
Christ proclaimed God a business
manager by saying "Seek ye first the
Kingdom of God," he aimed to make
the whole life religious. He teaches
that a man must inhale righteousness
before he can exhale it.

There is not an "I," or "me," or
"my" in the disciples prayer, but
plural words are used, "our," "us,"
and "we." My prayer must carry in
it embrace my brother on earth. Let
us not be a stumbling block for oth-
ers. Jesus changed the idea of great-
ness. The natural man says it is
great to be exalted. Jesus says it is
great to be a servant. The Cain
spirit kills his brother, while Jesus
prays for his murderers.
