### HORSES, WOMEN AND CHILDREN

**L**AST Decoration Day, in addition to the parades of Civil War veterans, there were, in many cities, parades of work horses in which many horses wore blue, red and yellow ribbons, badges given by humane societies in recognition of the care given the horses by their owners.

Such parades typified the emancipation of the defenseless horse from the overloading, the lashing, the cursing and rough treatment prevalent not many years ago. The propaganda against cruelty to horses has been so effective that now not only are most drivers humane in their treatment of these faithful servants, but a genuine pride is taken by the owners in keeping their horses sleek coated and adequately nourished.

Formerly drivers said that they must work their horses to the limit of every ounce of horse power, or that competitors would distance them by doing so. But experience has demonstrated that a mercifully treated horse is an economic advantage, because, though more work may be obtained for a brief space from a hard driven horse, his earlier death surely ends in business loss.

Employers of women and children in factory and sweat shops are just beginning to see the same light.

"Enterprisers" have explained that they must drive thin-blooded, hollow-eyed, consumptive women to death and employ children not much more than weaned, because of the fierce and utterly merciless competition between manufacturers; but the idea is gradually gaining ground that such doings are an economic mistake and altogether too expensive to indulge in.

The propaganda against these things, which is carried on by such enlightening and discriminating agencies as the American Consumers' League, is doing much to force the public to realize that "the poverty of Lazarus makes itself felt in the house of Dives"—through infection-ridden garments conveyed from the sweat-shop, along the bargain counter, to the family of the purchaser.

## CATTLE MARKET TRIFLE BETTER

**HOGS ADVANCED SLIGHTLY IN PRICE DURING PAST WEEK, AND SHEEP BROUGHT GOOD RETURNS**

 PORTLAND, Oct. 21.—Optimism ruled the cattle market last week, and prices were from 5c to 10c higher than they were the week previous. Prime steers and cows were in demand, and sold quickly. Best load of steers averaged \$5 early in the week. Other top sales were \$7.75 to \$7.80 and \$7.90 in small quantities.

Butcher stuff had a good outlet, and buyers filled orders with some choice cows, bulls and stage. Bulk cow top was \$6.50 and \$6.75, with one load at \$6.90. Steer range closed at \$7.50 and \$7.75, and bulls at \$5 and \$5.50.

A slight flurry on Thursday eased prices off about a nickel, but the stock offered was not extra choice. By and large, the beef situation has been very favorable.

## Dont Like Methods of Opening Oregon Lands

 WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 21.—The general land office has not yet decided definitely whether or not lands in the Deschutes and Paulina forest reserves aggregating 300,000 acres will be disposed of by lottery. Congressman Shinnott has informed Commissioner Tallman that objections to this system had been made in Oregon.

Tallman said that the department might allow settlers to go on lands for thirty days, and then open them for sale.

He thinks that perhaps this would be better than lottery, in which many must be disappointed. A determination on the matter may not be reached for two or three weeks.

Plans of lands in townships 26 and 27 of Lake county, near Fort Rock, have been sent to the surveyor general at Portland.

He is authorized to file them with the land office at Lakeview.

After being advertised for thirty days the lands will be opened for settlement.
