PUBLICITY.

THIS is an age of publicity. No business enterprise, no public institution, can hope to attain success without a liberal use of printer's ink. Cities and towns, too, have learned that in order to grow and prosper they must get into the light of publicity. We find progressive towns conducting comprehensive advertising campaigns to attract new business enterprises and more people to their locality, and they have demonstrated that the advertising brings results.

The value of the local newspaper, both as a means of publicity and of "boosting" the home town, is not always fully appreciated by the people of the place where it is published. There is no better index to the life of the people than the local newspaper. Its local columns tell of the social and industrial life, and its editorial voice the sentiment of a majority of the people. Its advertising columns show the spirit of the business interests—whether or not they are wide-awake and place the right value upon publicity.

The local newspaper is the most potent influence for the good of the town. It, more than any other institution, has the power to create and sustain the spirit of progress in the community. It is usually fair-minded in its attitude towards all public questions, and seeks to "put the people right" without malice or prejudice on matters that concern all the people of the town.

The local newspaper is ever ready to do its share and more in the up-building of its home town, and is always willing to assist any public enterprise; but if it were more generally appreciated and better supported its efforts would show greater results. In every town there are persons who are ready at every opportunity to criticize or find fault with the home paper if it says something that does not please them, but who are slow to commend its position when it is conceded on all hands that it has taken the right stand. There ought to be combined efforts of the people of the town and the local newspaper to "boost" the various interests of the community; to work together with a spirit of co-operation, and then everybody would be benefited by the results that would surely follow. Volturmo Burning in Mid-Ocean as Seen From the Grosser Kurfuerst



This photograph of the burning Volturmo, the Uranium liner, on which 138 lost their lives October 9th was taken from the deck of the North German Lloyd liner Grosser Kurfuerst. At the time the flames were breaking from the bow of the doomed vessel and the passengers were huddled in the stern. The flames had made so much progress that the vessel was listing at the bow and her stern was slightly tipped. Heavy seas broke over her, but not high enough to quench the fire.

The Volturmo was a twin screw steel steamship of 7,000 gross tonnage, with accommodations for 34 first cabin and 1,200 steerage passengers. She had two decks and a shelter deck. Her length was 340 feet, her beam 43 feet and her depth 28 feet 7 inches. She was built in 1904 by the Fairfield company, limited, of Glasgow, for the Canadian Northern Steamship company. Lloyd

rated her "A1." Her engines were capable of driving her eleven knots an hour. Her average voyage from Rotterdam to Halifax took fourteen days. She became an independent immigrant and trans-Atlantic packet in 1908, when the New York and Continental, then doing only a freight business, went into competition with other passenger carrying lines. Her carrier has been an eventful one. In

May, 1909, she was in peril from ice-bergs for twenty-four hours, and was carried far out of her course, all the time in danger of being crushed. In 1911, after she had been taken over by the Uranium line, the Dutch manager of the company, Rudolf W. Tuisley, was banished from Holland because the Volturmo arrived in Holland with 500 Russian immigrants who had been turned away from the United States as undesirable. Then in

March, 1912, she was quarantined because of an outbreak of smallpox in her steerage.

The one bright spot in her history was the rescue of the crew of 28 of the French fishing schooner Champagne, in a gale off the Grand Banks in March, 1907. She was commended for this by the French government. Captain James Harrison, then her commander, received a diamond medal.

Captain Inch was in command of the steamship Volturmo when she burned in mid-ocean. The rescued prize him for his judgment and his nerve, and they speak highly of the other officers. But members of the crew, they said, could not be restrained, and many women and children were lost because the crew went to the boats first.

FROM CREST OF STUKEL MOUNTAIN

Magnificent View of Klamath Country

Being on Account of Sunday's Trip by Peregrinators

There are no doubt hundreds of people who have been living in the Klamath country for years and yet know nothing of the wonders that surround them. I will confess that after three years' residence I am just beginning to appreciate what nature has provided close at hand for him who would go forth under the open sky.

Our trip to Stukel Mountain, which was planned for last Sunday, while not a success from the standpoint of attendance, was nevertheless enjoyed by the "cavalry division." Leaving town at 7 a. m., we proceeded under slow speed to the base of the hill which lies between the mountain and Klamath Falls. After a short wait for the main command, we decided to reconnoiter from the top of the first hill and try and locate the missing army, but a search through our field glasses failed to disclose any advancing hosts from the vicinity of the city, so after a short rest and consultation of war we determined to proceed alone.

One who contemplates the ascent of Stukel Mountain should first make inquiries from those who are acquainted with the mountain roads and trails, for being without a guide and knowing nothing of the mountain itself, we soon found that an attempt to make the ascent through the dense underbrush, fallen timbers and immense boulders was a strenuous undertaking. We alternated between horseback and on foot and after a couple of hours of good hard work we came out on the second peak, which is perhaps a quarter of a mile from the highest point. It was by this time 12:30 p. m. and as our hurried breakfasts were eaten shortly after 6 a. m. we decided to call a halt for mess. Unraddling our horses, we prepared to spend an hour in the shade. The view from the north side of this second peak is well worth the trip, for below and extending from mile upon mile is the beautiful Klamath Basin spread out like an immense checker board. Patches of sage alternate with squares of golden stubble, and the streams, ponds and canals relieve the view and add to the scene. It is here that one first begins to realize what an immense area is included in this so-called basin. Houses, barns and haystacks dot the landscape, but the thought will creep in that here in this magnificent valley is still room for thousands and that some day from the over crowded sections

people will overflow and find their way into this promised land as surely as the day and night succeed each other. If one were an artist and could transfer to canvas the view of this wonderful valley it would be a revelation, not only to the land-hungry in the cities, but to the residents of the Klamath country as well.

As far as the eye could reach beyond and through the gap at Olney could be seen mile after mile of the most glorious, the grandest country out of doors. The marsh lands containing wonderful possibilities also lay below us and a moment's reflection of what they would return to the husbandman if reclaimed and made tillable staggered one. Just as sure as the sun shines in the heavens, the Klamath country will come into its own and be known far and wide as the most wonderful country on earth. If you doubt this statement, climb Stukel Mountain and be convinced. There will be no need for argument, the fact simply steals from one all his former doubts and uncertainty and he sees for himself what all the literature and all the argument might have failed to produce in his mind. If one could take the land-seeker, the home-seeker and the investor to the top of Stukel Mountain upon his arrival in this country and there let him feast his eye upon the glorious view, it would only be a question of the particular location, for he would remain beyond a question of doubt.

Luncheon over, we again saddled and continued the journey. Working around on the west side of Stukel Mountain itself, about 300 yards below the peak another view burst upon our vision, and one that was even grander and more magnificent than from the north slope. Here below us was a view of the entire country. From the snow-clad peaks surrounding Crater Lake to the mountains far south of Tule Lake in California, one can feast on the beautiful panorama spread before him. The city of Klamath Falls itself nestling at the base of the surrounding hills is plainly visible and so close it seems that particular buildings can readily be distinguished. The marsh surrounding Agency Lake, Bare Island, Eagle Ridge, Buck Island, Shippington, Lake Ewauna, the Klamath river, Lower Klamath Lake, White Lake, Tule Lake, the Lava Bed, the little town of Merrill, all as if painted upon a canvas by the master artist. This wonderful

picture with its frame of towering mountains, touched here and there with dashes of pure white, while in all their splendor stand up Shasta and Mount Pitt and the peaks surrounding Crater Lake, is one that once seen will never be forgotten. It is impossible to describe it, for it has to be viewed to be appreciated. The overwhelming and all-absorbing conviction overcomes one that it is the grandest, the most magnificent country under the blue dome of heaven and that surely some day in the future its fame will spread and that thousands will follow the pathfinders and that the Klamath country will fulfill all predictions of its most enthusiastic boosters that here, indeed, is the promised land.
