Jealous Woman Cause of Finding Opium Ring

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22.—If practically dropped their acquaintance for that of Miss Louise Lorraine, a singer. This annoyed Miss Lorraine so much that when federal agents, who were trying to learn more of Poole, asked her concerning him, she was willing to tell all that she knew. She had no knowledge of the offenses he was alleged to have committed, but she furnished such clues that the agents found out for themselves—or thought they did—what they wanted to learn.

The authorities do not contend that Poole did all the actual smuggling, but they maintain that he was the head of a syndicate with branches in China, Mexico, Canada and many important American cities. They add that he made a fortune out of the business and that many of his alleged associates did not do badly at it from a financial standpoint. The authorities expect to show that the syndicate included Thomas Murphy, alias Andrews; Charles Taylor, alias Chung Chow, a Chinese, and nine local customs inspectors, all under arrest, and a man known as Charles Benton, for whom there are still lookout men.

Whether he was on a trip after opium, was trying to escape, or had some other reason for his journey, they did not know. At all events, they had him. He will soon be tried in the federal court here.

Albert Jewell, Aviator, Who Did Not Return From His Trip Over the Ocean



When Albert J. Jewell rose into the air at Hempstead, L. I., Monday, October 13th, the wind was blowing thirteen miles an hour. He started in the direction of the Belmont Race Park, but was wafted toward the ocean. He was last seen so far as is known flying over Rockaway Inlet at the ocean shore. He was then about 4,000 feet high.

There is a chance that Jewell was taken up by some coasting vessel or even a liner. But wireless messages have been sent broadcast in the search, and no news of him has been received.

Jewell was 27 years old, and had been flying less than a year. Six months ago he obtained his license under the name of "Sidney Gordon," because he did not wish to alarm his wife. Later he told his family of his work, and took his right name.

Although Jewell had never made a flight of more than an hour, he was recognized as very competent, having been a mechanic before he went into aviation.

EDITORIAL IN THE SIERRA EDUCATIONAL NEWS IS BOOSTING KLAMATH COUNTY SCHOOL FAIR

The following by Arthur H. Chamberlain, a chance visitor here during the county fair, is contained in the current issue of the Sierra Educational News, devoted to educational work in California:

"Superintendent Fred Peterson of Klamath county, Oregon, had an interesting exhibit at the county fair just closed at Klamath Falls, which we were privileged to visit. The main street of the town was lined with booths, one of which was devoted to the work of the schools of the county.

"In addition to exhibits of manual

training work for boys and domestic art for girls, there were shown vegetables and corn grown in the school children's contests.

"Of special interest was Superintendent Peterson's method of contrasting the various school districts of the county as to the amount of money expended for school purposes and character of school buildings. Photographs of the buildings in each district were shown, together with statistics as to assessed valuation of the district, salary of the teacher, the average salary paid in the county, etc.

"As might be supposed, some of the smaller districts, or those with the least assessed valuation, maintain school buildings more modern than those found in large or wealthy districts. This object lesson was an 'eye-opener' to the conservative taxpayers of those districts where the children were housed in shacks, or where the salary paid was below the average of the county.

"As an incentive making for modern school buildings, for commodious and attractive grounds, and for increased salary schedule and hence a superior grade of instruction, the plan suggested is excellent."

Highbrows and Huskies Start a 'Eugenic' Farm

BERLIN, Oct. 22.—A colony for breeding "aristocrats of the race"—physical Apollons and Junos and mental giants—is being started near Jena. In this colony each man—if he is physically handsome and mentally a genius—may have as many wives, not at one time, but successively.

The Mittgard "Rund" or society, which created a sensation last spring by announcing that the only way to check the deterioration of the race and race suicide was by establishing centers of "higher culture" where men physically and mentally fit could have numerous wives, is about to put its theory into practice. That is, they expect to if there are no legal obstacles.

For this purpose the society has purchased a farm near the great educational center of Jena. This farm is to be "stocked" with the best specimens of mankind. By a process of "selectivity" on this "eugenic farm," the human race is to be improved and regenerated.

According to members of the society, each fine physical and mental male specimen is to have one wife at a time "until the purpose of marriage has been accomplished." After that he may take another wife.

Each woman is to be physically perfect and a beauty. Two years is to be considered to be the limit of married life with one woman on the

"eugenic farm" and it may be dissolved after one year. In this way the society believes that in time a race known for its "beauty and brains" may be produced.

The society is reticent as to whether it will be necessary to go outside of the society to get the first specimens of either sex. It has no doubt the requirements, with whom the farm is to be started. The society professes to be perfectly serious in the matter.
