FOOD ADVERTISING

AS A RESULT of the enforcement
of the pure food laws, many
articles of food that were formerly
adulterated are no longer found in
our markets, says the State Food
Commissioner's Bulletin, but in their
places we have all kinds of com-
pounds, imitations and artificial pro-
ducts; therefore the purchaser
should be acquainted with the re-
quirements of the federal state laws
in regard to the labeling of articles.

Advertising has developed into a
science. The manufacturer of food
stuffs is frequently an advertising ex-
pert. Therefore, our billboards, pos-
ters, newspapers and magazines are
continually placing before us very at-
tractive cuts or catchily worded sen-
tences, to draw our eye toward
"Mann's Music Maker," "Cole's Cocoa
Confection" or "Dunn's Digestible
Doughnuts," to say nothing of the
many substitutes for the best baby
food known, namely, mother's milk.

Insofar as the fancy package in-
sures a greater measure of cleanli-
ness in the handling of such food, we
endorse it, but statements proclaim-
ing secret methods of manufacture,
higher rations of nutrition, etc.,
should be accepted very cautiously.

When we think of oat meal mush,
there comes before our mind's eye
pictures of the big, husky Scotch-
man; Corn Cake, the sturdy pioneer
of the Middle West, and of bacon and
beans that unconquerable American
soldier.

True, the inactive man or woman
does not require food of such heat-
making qualities as the above, but
the tendency of the present is too
much toward the other extreme, and
through the use of fancy imitations,
colors, flavors and preservatives it
will in time surely have a deteriorat-
ing effect upon our physical strength
as a nation.

The laws of Oregon require that
the presence of any quantity or pro-
portion of any morphine, opium, co-
caine, formaldehyde, salicylic acid,
boric acid or any other poisonous acid
or substance must be plainly printed
upon the label or container.

The use of benzoate of soda is al-
lowed in tomato catsup in the amount
of one-tenth of one per centum, and
its presence must also be stated upon
the label, but our manufacturers have
taken the privilege upon themselves
of using this preservative in many
other products, such as cider, pickles,
jellies and canned goods.

There are good labels, and others
not so good, but the purchaser should
be governed by the information
placed there for his or her guidance,
rather than by attractive or extrava-
gant statements.

Cement Plant Assured

A mutually satisfactory contract
between Jackson county and the
Beaver Portland Cement Company
for 50,000 barrels of cement to be
made at the Gold Hill plant for use
on the county highways, delivery to
begin June 1, 1914, has been drawn
up and approved by State Highway
Engineer H. L. Howlby, Attorney-
General Crawford and the state high-
way commission. It only awaits the
arrival of President Burch of the
company, who is due the latter part
of the week, to be formally executed
by both parties. The county is amply
safeguarded as to quality and deliv-
ery.—Ashland Tidings.

Cannery Is Next.

A modern fruit cannery, of ample
capacity to handle all the available
fruits, berries and vegetables grown
in this vicinity, would be a boon both
to the producers and to the com-
munity in general. A movement to
establish such an institution has been
taken up by Fred J. Heavens, of the
Heavens Bros. cannery at Green. He
was in conference with the board of
directors of the local fruitgrowers'
association last Saturday afternoon,
and they, individually, seemed well
pleased with the proposition.—Rose-
bury Review.

Are for Higher Tax.

At a meeting of the school officers
of Jackson county at the Medford
high school Saturday, it was unani-
mously voted to support the move-
ment in the state for a higher tax
for schools, so that a more uniform
system of taxation could be secured
and a committee was named to pre-
pare data on school finances and sub-
mit the same to the county court with
a view to securing an enlarged unit
of taxation so that the tax burden
may be more equally divided. An
increase of one mill is to be asked in
the school levy.—Medford Mail Trib-
une.
