LANE IMPRESSED WITH OREGON

Declares It Is Duty of U. S. to Irrigate

Says Bankers Are Too High in Their Interest Rates

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 19.—Fifty thousand square miles of barren land in Oregon can be converted into one of the most surpassing fertile regions in the world, according to Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior, by the application of water to it. Two great railroad systems have pushed their lines into this region, foreseeing its future possibilities, and the secretary, after making a personal inspection of it last month, is of the opinion that this almost uninhabited section of the state is mostly irrigable if waters available are conserved and distributed on the land.

How this will be brought about is not yet definitely planned, but the secretary believes that here and elsewhere in the West the government must undertake the reclamation of the land, as the undertaking is too great for private enterprise. Most of the bigger projects, he finds, have failed because of their very magnitude and the necessity of large investments of money, with a long period for the repayment of the investment by settlers. Therefore he advocates the expenditure of a sum amounting to perhaps \$100,000,000 for the reclamation of land which at present is waste and unproductive, but which, either through irrigation, or perhaps by drainage, can be made highly productive.

In one place in Oregon the secretary found that settlers on dry lands were hauling water even for domestic use a distance of ten miles, and doggedly staying with their dry farms in the hope that the government would some day undertake the bringing of water to their lands.

"We have less than 2 per cent of

the land under irrigation projects still open to settlement," said the sec-

retary, from which he reasons that the people will take up these lands as fast as the government can make them available. But he has come to the conclusion that ten years is not enough time in which to permit the farmers to take up these lands and secure from their cultivation profits sufficient to enable them to repay the government its purchase price for which they obligate themselves. He

would give the settlers twenty years, if needful, and make conditions easier for them to secure homes on government irrigated lands.

Moreover, the secretary found that bankers are charging settlers 10 and 12 per cent for the use of money, which he says is more than they can afford to pay. To meet this situation he favors the organization of water users associations and the extension of a rural credit system, the entire community pledging its credit for the repayment of the loans secured by settlers, who could then obtain better rates of interest.

It would be justifiable, the secretary believes, to allow settlers on these projects a period of four or five years during which they would not be required to make any payments on their lands, as they usually have insufficient capital at the start to buy stock and make the best use of their land.

Another thing that struck the secretary was the unfavorable attitude of the West toward the interior department, and the reason he felt was in the excessive restrictions of red tape in handling public business. He believes that some way must be found to abolish the red tape, and he intends to devise plans for decentralization in the management of land office business. Like Senator Lane of Oregon, and others, he believes that the bureaucracy hampers the transaction of business between the people and the government.

Secretary Lane said that he believed that within ten years there would be a transcontinental railroad to Alaska, perhaps from Chicago, and that it might be through co-operation with Canada.
