Working to Eradicate Music That Is Smutty

CHICAGO, Oct. 29. Banishment of the "smut music" heard so much today in public music halls and theaters and the popularizing of "high class but not necessarily high brow" music, is today the greatest ambition of Henry D. Legler, chief librarian of the Chicago public library.

Librarian Legler declares he has the right answer. "He started several years ago with an idea and \$4,000 to make America the equal of Germany as a nation of music lovers, and to create a general appetite for good music equal to the appetite for good reading in this country. He declared today that realization of his ideal still is far off, but that his advance toward the goal of his ambition has been so steady that he believes he will live to see his greatest ideals realized.

Already he has been opportunely public officials of many large and small cities to explain his campaign of musical education of the general public. Here's how Librarian Legler is doing it. When the \$4,000 appropriation was turned over to the library Legler induced the board to buy seven copies of each of 100 of the best known opera scores, vocal and instrumental pieces that are classics, not just written especially for the ears of high brow," as Legler put it.

Through efficient systems of publicity these acquisitions were made known to the general public, who responded in far larger numbers than Legler ever hoped for. The music, heavily bound, is circulated as are the books.

"I am convinced," said Legler today, "that there are hundreds of thousands of homes in America where classical music would be given royal welcome if the families had the means. I believe in music in the home not alone for its cultural effect, but because its moral effects are good. If the music is good."

He believes introduction of good music in American homes will mean banishment of the smut song and smut music forever. We made a start last year as an experiment. It isn't an experiment any longer. We will not appeal merely to high brow. We will appeal to the masses. We will circulate it to the masses.

It would be a good plan to have a board of censors composed not of soulful, long haired high brow, but of liberal minded lovers of real music, who would let in those fascinating, lively popular airs and songs that do not depend wholly on their noise, smut and raucousness to attract. The music will be both vocal and instrumental."

What the Tariff Will Do for Us

A Careful Study of the New Measure by an Expert

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 30.—From the garret to the cellar, furnishing the American home should be cheaper when the new tariff law gets into good working order.

Import duties on curtains, furniture, carpets, table linen, glass and chinaware, kitchen utensils and other household articles are all sharply cut. Some of the tax reductions may eventually filter through to Mrs. American Housekeeper. Foes of the law—its political enemies—assert that the tariff slashing will have little effect upon American pocketbooks at retail stores. The duties on household furniture have been cut from 35 to 15 per cent. While little foreign furniture is bought by Americans, the sliding off of 20 per cent of the tax at the American seashore will stimulate foreign competition, and, demographers believe, force down prices.

Lumber also is on the free list, giving American manufacturers of furniture the opportunity to buy Canadian planks cheaper. Sanguine democrats believe 5 per cent will be a fair decrease in retail furniture prices, a predicted saving of \$5 on \$100 worth of new furniture.

Fifteen per cent duty is taken off kitchen utensils, but foreign competition is slight in this field. The reduction is potent, however, with power to force retail prices lower on pots, pans and kettles of American manufacture. Aluminum ware should be cheaper, the duty having been cut about 40 per cent. Putting in a new furnace may be more pleasurable, economically, under the new law, as the duty on such housewarmers has

been reduced from 48 to 20 per cent. However, few foreign furnaces are now imported.

For the dining room table, dishes of china, porcelain, earthenware and stone are reduced in duty about one-fifth. The retail price on these articles is expected by the friends of the law to drop at least 5 per cent, affording a saving, for instance, on \$1 on a set of dinner dishes worth \$20. On cheap earthenware and pottery, a reduction of retail prices can hardly be expected.

While the duty on cotton tablecloths is reduced from 40 to 25 per cent, estimated importations next year are only \$100,000, not enough, it is believed, to cut retail prices even at the department stores. Cotton towels, doilies, blankets, sheets and pillow cases, etc., are reduced from about 45 to 25 per cent in the new law. Some slight retail price reductions are expected to result. Linoleum should be slightly cheaper. Foreign imports next year under the new law are expected to aggregate \$2,000,000, and force retail reductions in this country. Duty on cotton window curtains reduced about 13 per cent and some portion of that reduction may reach the buyer.

A saving of from 25 to 50 cents on woolen blankets is expected by the friends of the new law, because of the sweeping tariff reductions on wool and its products. This decrease will hardly be felt for a year or more. From 5 to 10 per cent slashes in retail prices on cotton and woolen carpets is also confidently predicted by the democrats.

Rubber Imports Are Enormous

India rubber imports into the United States in the fiscal year 1913 were the largest in the history of the import trade. They amounted in crude rubber to 113,000,000 pounds, as against 110,000,000 in the former high record year, 1912, this being the third time in which the imports of this article exceed 100,000,000 pounds in a fiscal year. These figures apparently sustain the frequently published assertion that the United States consumes half the rubber of the world.
