MAKING ITS LAST FIGHT.

IT is evident that the liquor busi-
ness in Oregon, as it has been con-
ducted in the past, is doomed.

Each succeeding election the
people of the state in larger numbers
take their stand against the saloon
and this sentiment is becoming
strongest among the business men
and the employers of labor. The in-
creasing demand from the corpora-
tions, railroads and employers of la-
bor, for efficiency has resulted in en-
forced prohibition among their em-
ployees. The benefits from this prac-
tice have been so great that employ-
ers and employees alike are asking
the question, Why any saloons?

There is much to be said against
the saloon that is true, and really
nothing to be said in its favor. It
can hardly be expected that the
liquor business will cease to exist, at
least not for some time to come, but
the saloon as it is today is making its
last fight.

THE SALEM HOG.

WITH 50 per cent of all the state
buildings located at Salem, and
with the Marion county delega-
tion at each session of the legislature
asking for the bulk of the appropria-
tions to be used at Salem, it would
seem that the people of that county
would reciprocate and give its sup-
port to a much needed appropriation
for another institution that happened
to be located in another county.

Marion county has the questionable
distinction of being one of the few
counties in the state that went
against the University appropriation
bills, and its majority against the
university was the largest of any of
the counties. The people of Marion
county have nothing to feel proud of
in their action at the polls on Novem-
ber 4th.

ber of our people are directing their
attention to nut culture. Roscoe
Green is preparing twelve acres of
choice river bottom ground to be
planted this fall to English walnuts
of the Franquette type. It has been
demonstrated beyond a question of
a doubt that English walnut culture
is a success in Douglas county, and
the man that plants a 10-acre tract
to walnuts now is bound to derive a
handsome income from same in ten
or twelve years. Mr. Green informs
your correspondent that he is now
experimenting with the saber para-
gon chestnut and may plant ten acres
to chestnut trees next season.—Rose-

N. Y. DEMOCRATS TO REORGANIZE

NEW ANTI-TAMMANY ORGANI-
ZATION IS FAVORED BY YOUNGER
MEMBERS, AND FUNDS FOR FI-
NANCING ARE ASSURED

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—There are
strong indications of a new organiza-
tion to represent New York democ-
rats as a result of the defeat of Tam-
many. A new deal in the party is
certain.

One faction, headed by the younger
element of the party, favors a new
organization, opposed to Tammany
methods. It is said that there are in
favor enough rich men to finance the
organization.

Conservatives believe a complete
re-organization of Tammany is suf-
ficient. They think if Murphy is oust-
ed they can turn the organization's
powerful machinery toward reform.

Many want to even drop the name
Tammany. "County Democracy" is
one of the many titles suggested for
the reorganized machine.

French Wines to Be Higher.

PARIS, Nov. 7.—French wines, it
was declared today, will cost more
this winter than ever before because
the wine crops in the district of Bur-
gundy are ruined, according to gov-
ernment statistics published today.
Owing to too much rain, the grapes
have failed to ripen and mildew has
set in, injuring not only the fruit,
but the vines also. Winegrowers
have been reduced to the extremity
of asking financial relief from the
government.

America Is Richest of the World's Nations

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—Next to the
United States, Germany is the wealth-
iest nation in the world in its aggre-
gate of wealth. Germany's national
wealth, according to Dr. Karl Heff-
erich, director of the Reich Bank,
Germany's biggest financial institu-
tion, who has just made a report to
the Kaiser, is between \$75,000,000,
000 and \$78,000,000,000.

That of the United States, accord-
ing to the last census, is \$125,000,
000,000; England, sixty-five billions
and France sixty billions.
Second in national wealth, Germany
however, ranks fourth in the per cap-
ita wealth of its population.

If all Germany's wealth were
equally distributed, each man, woman
and child would have about \$1,100.
In France each would have \$1,425,
where the per capita wealth is high-
est in the world. England and the
United States dispute which has the
greater per capita wealth.

The English say they could dis-
tribute between \$1,250 and \$1,385
to each man, woman and child, while
in the United States each would re-
ceive \$1,260.

The annual income of the German
people is given by Hefferrich as ap-
proximately \$10,000,000. Approxi-
mately \$2,000,000 is expended an-
nually for public purposes.

The German people, says Hefferrich,
save about one billion dollars
annually, which, together with the
automatic increased value of prop-
erty, adds close to three billion dol-
lars a year to the national wealth in
aggregate. Hefferrich shows the
Kaiser that Germany's wealth has
practically doubled since he ascended
the throne.

One of the largest and most val-
uable timber trees of the country is
the tulip tree, known to lumbermen
as yellow poplar. It is related to the
magnolias, but is the only tree of
its kind in the world.

One of the principal by-products
of the national forests of Japan is
furnished by mushrooms, which have
yielded in one year a revenue of a
million dollars.

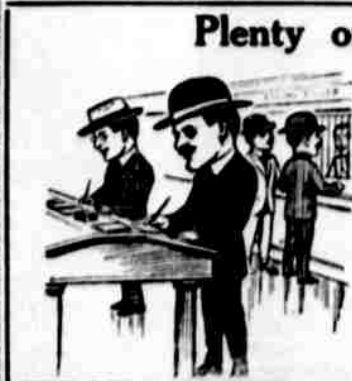
