M'LEMORE AFTER MORE LIVESTOCK

LEAVES THIS AFTERNOON FOR CALIFORNIA, ARIZONA AND TEXAS TO LOOK OVER THE CATTLE SITUATION

D. M. McEmlen, well known for his livestock operations in this section, leaves this afternoon for California, to look over the cattle situation. From there he will go to Arizona and Texas, close to the Mexican border.

McEmlen will purchase several thousand head of cattle while away, and these will be pastured in the Sacramento Valley this winter. In the spring they will be marketed.

In several months past McEmlen has brought several thousand head of cattle to Klamath county from the south, as well as to Shasta Valley and Modoc county. A large percentage of this is beef cattle, here to pasture, but included in the lot were several hundred head of choice dairy cattle, purchased by Klamath county farmers and dairy men.

And these prices I cannot pay. (Apologies to Mr. Kipling)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 8.—If Mr. Kipling had waited until today to write that poem in which he made a lot of women dislike him when he declared—

"For a woman is only a woman that a good cigar is a smoke."

It would have been necessary for him to replace the cigar with a pipe to make it appeal to the average man, for the measure treated the cigar and cigarette as luxuries. Which means that instead of reducing import duties on them, they either remained the same or were increased. My Lady Nicotine received few favors from the new tariff law. Devotees of the weed do not stand much chance of a saving any money under the new law, unless they smoke it in pipe form. If he smokes a clay pipe he'll be able to save more.

The same old import tax of \$1.85 per pound on filler tobacco is in effect today. American smokers paid \$6,120,000 last year on this grade of tobacco. Likewise the old duty of 35 cents a pound on unstemmed filler tobacco prevails. \$17,000,000 went
