To Fight Blight

At a mass meeting of Rogue River Valley orchardists at the public library Saturday afternoon it was decided to form a permanent organization, the purpose of which will be to devise ways and means whereby the pear blight may be more effectively combated than is possible under the present system. S. Vilas Beckwith, who was named permanent chairman, was, on the motion of Ben Sheldon, instructed to select a committee of nine men to consider the problem of blight and confer with the county court respecting methods of controlling and eventually eradicating it.—Medford Sun.

Lots of Spuds

One of the best potato crops reported this year was that grown by R. H. Boydston on the Mrs. Annie Harvey ranch on the West Side. Off from 2 1/2 acres of land Mr. Boydston secured 34,138 pounds, or an average of 921 1/2 pounds or 52 1/2 bushels of potatoes per acre. The potatoes were of exceptionally good quality, as the West Side is considered the best portion of the valley when it comes to raising dry-land tubers.—Lake County Examiner.

Filth on the Stage Is Gaggling, He Says



John R. Bickerton has shocked his fellow theatrical managers in New York city by the statement of some plain truths which they seldom discuss in the open.

"We'll have filth on the stage till the public finds its stomach has turned," said he. Mr. Bickerton, whose partner is young Mr. Zeigler, he of the baking powder \$49,000,000, has just produced the "Love Leash." It has run about two weeks, but long enough to prove that New York didn't want it, and so it will be taken off. The "Love Leash" was a clean play. It didn't pretend to teach a moral lesson in a bawdy house nor reform society by the exhibition of the private conscience of degenerates. Other plays which have done so and just evaded action by the New York county grand jury have succeeded.

"I think the New York public which goes to the theater is tired of nastiness," said Mr. Bickerton. "I think moral plays will be successful." But Mr. Bickerton is really a lawyer, who took up the theater as a side line. His theatrical experience is not as wide as that of some very successful producers of New York.

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What the Tariff Will Do for Us

A Careful Study of the New Measure by an Expert

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 11.—Sportsmen—and also sports—should give three cheers for the new tariff law. It's going to be slightly cheaper to be both. Sporting and forest, field and stream and ground—the green table—are all made less costly by new tariff provisions. Sporting and fishing outfits for sportsmen and playing cards for the sportsman will probably be sold cheaper at retail with present reduced import taxes. If the full tariff reductions in the new law are chopped off the price of foreign packs of playing cards, they should sell for about 20 cents a pack, instead of 25 cents and up.

More real economies in outfitting are possible for the hunter and fisherman, however. Present retail prices of shotguns, rifles, automatic pistols and revolvers that are imported should be cut about 15 per cent. If the ultimate consumer is given the entire benefit of tariff reductions, imported shotguns, rods, reels, flies, artificial bait, nets, seine and other tackle duties are reduced as much in the new law. The large home production of tackle, it is believed, will prevent any radical price slashing in the rank and file of American fishermen. However, every little bit helps.

Striking at the "powder trust" in the new law, the democrats have sought to make shooting cheaper. Instead of a tax of 2 to 4 cents a pound on gunpowder in the former law, powder comes in free today. The democrats estimate that 4,000,000 pounds will be imported next year to the value of \$2,500,000. The democrats believe, although republican tariff makers deny, that this situation will force down retail prices of shells and cartridges to the American manufacturer and to some extent to the purchaser at sporting goods stores.

For the hunter the new bill cuts taxes on foreign hunting knives about 12 per cent. Sweaters, boots and other hunting equipment should be sold cheaper at retail, if manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers, do not themselves absorb greedily all

benefit from tariff reductions forcing lower prices through competition in our markets. But the joys of fighting mosquitoes may cost more, for the bill increases the tax on citronella oil, the anti-skeeter "dupe," 20 per cent. Imports of \$100,000 worth of this antiseptic remedy are expected next year. While the law reduces the tariff cost of imported bicycles and motorcycles 30 per cent, it is not generally believed that bikes or the "pupp-pupp" vehicles will be sold cheaper to Americans, because of the superiority and popularity of home-made American supremacy in manufacturing baseball and tennis supplies is expected to prevent any retail price inroads by foreign competition on these articles.

Coal Is Found

That Douglas county has a great wealth stored up in coal is the belief of twenty-four applicants who today backed up their judgment and made claims on 2,449 acres of government land situated in township 26. The land is located 23 miles due east of Roseburg in the government reserve, and is said to be many miles in extent. Prospecting has been done in this region for the past three years, and about two weeks ago a number of persons came here from various parts of the country and went out to the land and made a personal inspection of the character of the coal and the situation of the land.—Roseburg News.
