reports from the storm indicate that 150 sailors are missing on shipwrecked vessels in the Great Lakes.

Four steel steamers on Lake Huron, each carrying a crew of twenty men, are eighty hours overdue. They have not been reported.

Scores of corpses are being washed to the shores of lakes Huron and Superior.

It is estimated that twenty-five boats were lost in the storm. Their value is placed at \$3,750,000. Besides this, the cargoes will aggregate a value of more than a million.

The value of imports into Chile by parcel post during 1912 amounted to \$1,992,324.

A New York electrician has invented an electrical apparatus for drying printed sheets as they come from the photogravure presses, permitting high grade work to be done at greater speed than formerly.

## New Signalling Plan Makes Travelling Safe

CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 12.—Seven years ago Carl Buhl, then 19, witnessed a railroad wreck. An engineer of a switch engine had asked a tower man whether a certain passenger train had passed that point. He was informed it had, and pulled his engine onto the track. A few minutes later the engineer was dead, a passenger train was wrecked, and several other lives were lost in the collision. The tower man had made a mistake.

Today Carl Buhl, electrician and inventor, has perfected what he believes to be the one complete, most important railroad signalling and safety device in existence. His invention, he claims, flashes danger signals before the engineer's eyes, right in the engine cab—hence fog or other bad weather conditions will not interfere with the engineer getting all signals.

An ingenious contact device is the

key to the invention. In explaining his device Buhl shows a miniature locomotive on a miniature track. A white light burns in the engineer's cab as long as the track is clear for three "blocks" ahead.

Another train on the track within that distance causes a contact which shows a green light in the cab. Within three blocks of any break in the rails the contact flashes a red light in the cab. If for some reason the lights should not work, a bell rings automatically.

Perhaps the most valuable part of the invention is seen when the engineer dies or falls unconscious at his post. If such is the case, and the red or green light shows, the brakes are automatically thrown on when the train enters the last block. Buhl has worked for seven years on the invention and is seeking recognition from the railroads. He is considering placing his invention before members of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Minor matters will be settled at Portsmouth, but where presentations to the admiralty itself are necessary the financial secretary will meet the deputations in London.
