## What the Tariff Will Do for Us

### A Careful Study of the New Measure by an Expert

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—There's  
a real, unalloyed joy contained in the  
new Democratic tariff. If positive  
prophecies materialize—and a score or  
more of wholesale and retail grocers  
here have declared they will. It will  
cost every family in the United States  
about one-half dollar less a year for  
the same kind of a Thanksgiving  
dinner they had in 1912. And, of  
course, the saving will not be possi-  
ble only on the Thanksgiving din-  
ner. It applies to every meal, day  
in and day out, throughout the year.  
Assuming that the average family  
consists of five persons, in a popula-  
tion of 90,000,000 people, that would  
be 18,000,000 families who will be  
able to save fifty cents on Thank-  
sgiving dinner alone, or a grand total  
of \$9,000,000 saved by the United  
States on this feast day.

Here is the Democratic "dope"  
calculating that retail prices on  
Thanksgiving provender will be re-  
duced as much as the new tariff law  
reduces import duties. On a tem-  
porary turkey the tariff is cut 30  
cents, providing that the imported  
turkey was brought in dead. If "on  
the hoof," the saving would be 40  
cents a head. That Canadian turkeys  
will be imported this year and force  
down prices, at least in the East and

New England, is expected.  
The tariff on cranberries is reduced  
about 2 cents a quart. Five quarts  
of these for the ordinary family—if  
the tariff reduction extends to the  
family grocer—would result in ten  
cents saving. Saving of another dime  
on vegetables, most of which are on  
the free list in the new law, is  
another Democratic calculation.

If wines are bought, the new tariff  
will not effect any Thanksgiving  
economy. The same old duty of 30  
cents a quart remains on champagne  
under the new law. Ale and beer  
are taxed 45 cents a gallon, as they  
were before October 3. Oysters,  
lobsters and other shellfish are not  
doubtful under the new law, neither  
were they under the Old Payne act.  
But plums for the Thanksgiving  
pudding may be bought cheaper, as  
the duty has been reduced from about  
25 cents to 10 cents a bushel.

The principal reliance for reduc-  
tion of the cost of the Thanksgiving  
dinner is placed by the Democrats,  
however, on the reduced duties on  
poultry and vegetables. Last year  
only \$20,000 pounds of poultry were  
imported, but under the new law, in-  
cluding the 1912 Thanksgiving  
period, importations of 1,200,000  
pounds are expected.

## Declare War Against Convict-Made Clothes

CHICAGO, Nov. 18.—A protest  
against prison labor in the manufac-  
ture of shirts, pants and overalls was  
expressed to be the chief bomb touched  
off by the National Association of  
Garment Manufacturers, which met  
here for a two days' convention at the  
Hotel Sherman today. It will be  
urged that garment manufacturers  
throughout the country cannot profit-  
ably compete with prison manufac-  
tured goods.

Steps will probably be taken look-  
ing toward the elimination of this  
phase of workmanship from the penal  
institutions of the country.

The National Association of Gar-  
ment Manufacturers comprises the  
leading makers of shirts, pants, and  
overalls in the United States. The  
association employs approximately

150,000 men, has \$10,000,000 invest-  
ed in fixed capital, and markets mer-  
chandise to the value of \$50,000,000  
annually.

One hundred and fifty of the lead-  
ing garment makers of the country  
were present at today's initial session  
of the tenth semi-annual convention.

Another situation against which  
the association will take a determined  
stand is the alleged threat trust,  
which it has bitterly fought for years.  
Some action may also be taken to  
guard against a repetition of the dis-  
astrous strike of the garment work-  
ers which tied up the industry last  
winter.
