BROWNSVILLE, Texas, Nov. 19,-Five thousand rebels, under General Gonzales today crushed the 3,000 federal troops garrisoning at Victoria

Gonzales telegraphed rebel headquarters at Matamoras that the rebels expense is to be defrayed by a fund jost four officers and forty men in the fight. The federals lost about 300

By taking the garrison the rebols captured four cannon, many rides, a big supply of ammunition and 300 cavalry horses.

The federals were pursued thirty miles from Victoria, becoming badly routed and disorganized.
