U. S. LAND SHOW STARTED TODAY

EASTERN STATES ARE EXHIBITING THIS YEAR—REUTER'S ORANGE DRY FARM DISPLAY IS A FEATURE

CHICAGO, Nov. 20.—Thousands of farmers from all parts of the Middle West flocked into Chicago today for the opening of the United States Land Show at the Coliseum. The exhibition, one of the most picturesque that is staged here annually, will continue until December 8th.

The feature of the show this year that excited the most comment was the marked invasion of the West by the East. New York, West Virginia, Maryland and Ohio were represented with displays.

Mechanical models of irrigation systems and railway engineering feats in the Rockies were the features of Canada's exhibits.

The West was represented by the Great Northern railway with the largest individual display in the Coliseum, the state of Oregon, Tulare county, Calif., and the seven southern counties of California in a joint exhibit.

The United States was officially represented by the display of the department of agriculture, congress having made an appropriation of \$20,000 for the display, which will be taken from Chicago to Tulsa, Okla., after the exhibit here closes.

PICK HARVARD UNIVERSITY TO WIN

ed as containing more bull than dog. Harvard is picked to win, and should win Saturday. If the Crimson lives up to expectations, Captain Storor's team will turn the trick of having defeated Yale in two successive years for the first time in history.

Harvard came out on top last year by a score of 20 to 0, and the tacking of another victory without a break will establish a precedent.

They are not very strong for breaking precedents in the staid section of the country where "Yalers" and "Harvarders" are cultivated. But every once in a while a Harvard man grows up in such a manner that in time it is almost forgotten where he got his pronunciation, and the stout eleven representing the Crimson may do some precedent.

At all events, everyone in Cambridge, from the drooping-eyed sophomore, whose mention of Harvard is as devoid of "ra" as Mexico is of peace, to the oldest Old Grad, is getting down his money on the Crimson. At this coming conflict Yale has two big things against her and one in her favor. Against Yale is arrayed Brickley, Harvard's great full-back, and the Blue's weakness.

Precedent alone stands in her favor. History tells us that a few healthy wallopings, such as Charles Brickley is capable of dealing usually puts precedent on the blink.

No mention of Harvard is complete without Brickley. He is undoubtedly the greatest drop kicker developed in the country. He shoots them over with unerring aim from the 35 or 50-yard line without effort. As an open field runner he has few equals. His team mate, Eddie Mahan, probably can come closer to Brickley than any other man in this department. Both wiggle through a broken field, and it takes a sure tackle to down them.

Before the Princeton game Harvard was credited with having the greatest backfield and greatest line in the country. This proved to be largely a myth. Princeton out-rushed Harvard, and Streit, the Tiger fullback, ripped through the line for big gains. The backfield is great only when Mahan or Brickley are in line.

Captain Storor is a great end, but other players of the team showed little to distinguish them from the average good varsity player.

Yale has plowed along in a bad ditch throughout the season. Injuries have kept Blue regulars out of the lineup, and the team sent against Harvard will be shy five of the best men in the Yale camp.

Cornish, the best quarterback developed, was put out with a broken shoulder, and others have been in and out on the hospital list.

Harvard has won but six games from Yale since the two universities started playing football in 1875. The record for ten years follows:
