SAM, JOHN BULL TO HOLD JUBILEE

TWO ENGLISH SPEAKING NATIONS WILL CELEBRATE CENTURY OF GOOD FEELING BETWEEN THEM.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—"We expect to have very little trouble in raising the \$200,000 necessary to carry out England's share of the project for commemorating the 100th anniversary of the establishment of peace among English-speaking peoples," today announced H. S. Ferris, secretary of the British committee. "The sum we have asked the public for is relatively insignificant when the great national importance of the celebration is considered. The disarmament of the Canadian-American frontier alone has saved both countries enormous expense."

The British program includes the erection of a memorial of the centenary of peace in Westminster Abbey; the purchase of Sulgrave Manor, Northamptonshire, the ancestral home of the Washington family, and its maintenance as a place of pilgrimage for Americans in England; the foundation of a permanent chair of Anglo-Saxon history, to be held in succession by a series of eminent British and American historians, and the endowment of a scheme of annual prizes in the elementary and secondary schools for essays on topics relating to Anglo-American history.

In France experiments with freezing fish in blocks of ice for transportation are being tried, the assertion being made that they can be revived by slow thawing and sold alive.

PRIESTS MAKE A DARING RESCUE

LED BY OCTOGENARIAN, DASH INTO BURNING CHURCH AND RESCUE SACRED VESSELS, EMERGING BADLY BURNED

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—While six hundred Catholics were kneeling in the ember strewn streets last night, five priests braved the smoke and flames and rescued from the burning tabernacle of St. Mary's Star of the Sea church last night, and rescued the sacred vessels, etc.

When the quintet finally emerged they staggered from the burning edifice, their cassocks burning, their faces and hands charred, but they held above their heads the sacramental vessels.

Monsignor O'Connell, aged 80, arose from his sick bed and led the rescue.
