Mass meetings were held at La
Pine and Crescent Saturday at which
resolutions were passed condemning
the secretary of agriculture as shown
in his letter regarding elimination of
30,000 acres of forest reserve lands
in this territory. The phrases in the
letter objected to intimate that the
jack pine lands of the Upper Des-
chutes Valley are practically worth-
less for agricultural purposes. Sec-
retary of the Interior Lane was ap-
pealed to for aid. When Chief For-
ester Graves was in Oregon he failed
to make any inspection of this re-
gion, although urged to do so. Ap-

ating from Portland forestry office.
