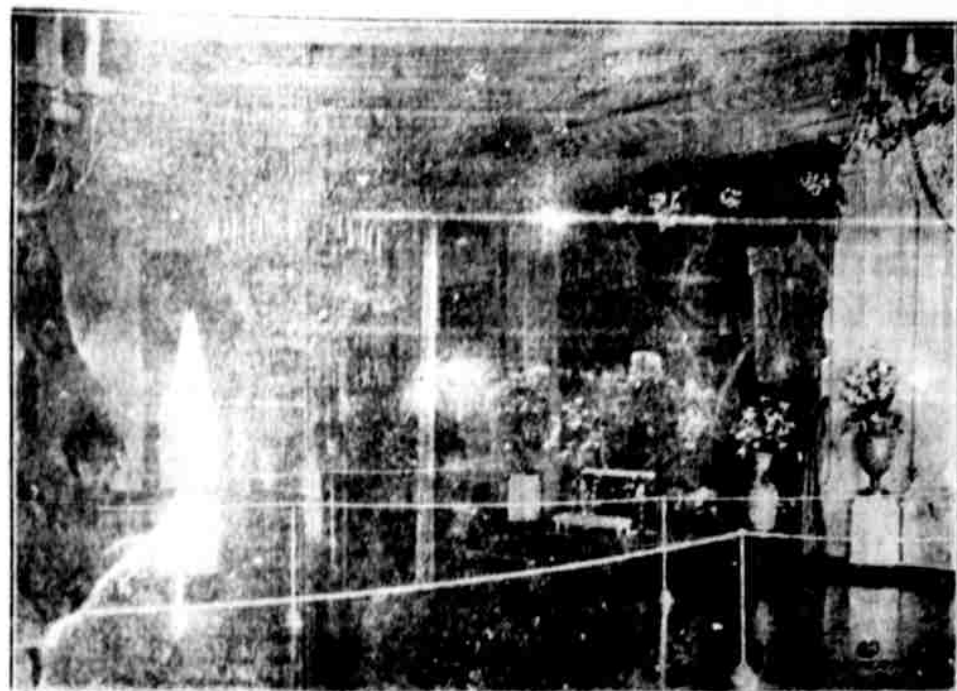

Official Report of Progress on Project

The following reports of conditions on the Klamath Project at the end of October are contained in the current issue of the Reclamation Record:

Operation and Maintenance

All grain crops harvested and threshed and the marketing of these crops was well under way. The prices prevailing were as follows: Wheat, \$1.25 per cwt.; oats, \$1.10; barley, \$1; hay, \$8 to \$10 per ton in the stack; potatoes, \$0.85 per cwt.

Shipments of fat cattle were very heavy and will continue, as excellent fall pasturage was produced by the warm weather. The prices ranged from \$0.95 to \$0.65 per pound.

There were shipped out during the month 97 cars of cattle, 46 cars of sheep, 3 cars of horses, 33 cars of wheat, 23 cars of barley, 4 cars of oats and 18 cars of potatoes.

The dairy business continues in high favor with most of the farmers. The creamery at Klamath Falls produced 14,000 pounds of butter during the month and the price of butter fat paid the farmers was \$0.33 per pound.

Two repair crews were engaged in the cleaning and strengthening of

canals and one party was engaged in replacing wooden structures. Food program was made by the drainage excavator in the cleaning and deepening of drain "B" near Merrill.

Construction

Weather conditions were very good throughout the month. Low temperatures prevailed and two light rains fell during the forepart of the month. The elevation of Tule Lake was 4,651.7 at the end of the month and Clear Lake 4,529.7.

A small force of men and teams was engaged on the South Pole Valley laterals and sub-laterals. Numerous farm bridges, turnouts, drops, etc., were installed during the month. The gasoline excavator excavated about 3,200 lineal feet on "B" drain in the vicinity of Merrill.

The earth excavation on the Adams Canal enlargement was progressing satisfactorily under 14 small contracts and good progress was made on the rock work by government forces. The old wooden checks were being replaced by concrete structures.

Field work was confined almost entirely to the Adams Canal work. Plans and descriptions were prepared for the Melrose-Ryan and Adams Canal right of way matters.

OUR WEEKLY SERMON**"The Wonderful Father"**

Text, Lu. 15:20—"His father saw him and was moved with compassion and ran and fell on his neck and kissed him."

The scribes and Pharisees saw Jesus at a feast eating with publicans and sinners, and they said: "This man receiveth sinners and eateth with them." If there ever was a true saying about Jesus, this is one. When Jesus discovers that they are speaking

scornfully of Him, he paints them three pictures—the first one was of the Lost Sheep, the second of the Lost Coin, and the third one of the Lost Son. We wish at this time to call this picture "The Wonderful Father."

In the parable of the lost sheep we see the father's tenderness and our helplessness. In the lost coin we see His patience and our latent value, while in the last number of the parabolic trinity we see our Father's forgiveness and our saving penitence.

This son, usually known as the Prodigal, made an error, then made a home run for the city of refuge. The son is wilful and tired of home restraint, but the father did not try to hold him, and allowed him to go into the school of hard knocks. It seems that the boy was not angry, but hangs around home a few days, and when he is finally ready to go I hear his father say: "This world is not what you expect it to be, but when you are down and out, remember your old father, and come back home."

The first symptom of dissatisfaction is uneasiness after the day's work is done, when he looks toward the city and longs to be his own boss. One has said "God is our Father, the church is our mother, and so many desire to be free from parental care." Home restraint is unbearable when a man becomes tired of Divine control and Gospel freedom, and God lets them try the world. But He wants us to know that we cannot go to condemnation alone. Every community has its leader in society, and morality and like when the top floor of a building falls all the other floors are carried with it, so, no man liveth or dieth unto himself.

This boy "wasted his substance in riotous living." It is a law of life that we become like those with whom we associate. The butterfly and the frog take on the color of the object over which they hover or rest. A chip can float with the current, but it takes a live fish to swim up stream. But "when he had spent all" he came to himself. His money melted like butter on hot bread; his well went dry, and he reached the end of his rope. He punctured a tire and slid from the hall of worldly pleasure to the pen of the long months. Now if he was a Jew the long business was unlawful, but so it is with all the work of the devil. Then comes hunger for work and home in his father's house. When men leave the church they often are hungry for the services. There is hope for the man who thinks, for the Bible says: "There is madness in the sinner's heart." Reason enthroned thinks of self preservation, and he resolves "to arise and go to his father." When he decided to go home he left the swine in the "far country." Oh, if when people come into the church they could leave the world outside! He came home just as he was, with all of his sin and rage. Now, see the wonderful father running to meet his lost son, "who was dead but is now alive." Then came the feast and the Bible does not say that it ever ended. Finally, on his finger was placed a ring, without beginning or end, a symbol of eternal love. God will not force you to come home, but he waits your coming today.
