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OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"The Cup of Life"

"But Jesus answered and said, Ye know not what ye ask. Are ye able to drink of the cup that I shall drink of, and be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with? They say unto him, We are able."—Matt. 26:22.

For ten thousand years or more, God has been trying to teach men how to drink the cup of life. For the same time the devil has been trying to teach them how to drink death's cup. A serpent's eye can catch the rays of the sun and reflect them in prismatic beauty into the eyes of a man and thus fascinate him to his death. Circe, on her enchanted island, lured to their death the companions of Odysseus, but he, drinking from a magic cup, saved himself. The trouble with everything that is troubled is that so much of the beautiful and pure and good of life is used for evil purposes. This makes men beastly. A man condemned to die upon a scaffold would find little consolation in having the path from his cell to the scaffold strewn with roses. Yet men, in the grasp of wrong, find pleasure in the beauties of sin that are strewn in the pathway of the downward life. But when the scaffold looms before them, the roses fade from view, and there is more consolation in a priest.

The world has always wanted some magic potion to save itself when it has discovered its true predicament. It has felt itself unequal to the task. Odysseus is only one of all the world. There is a magic cup. The mother of James and John sought for her sons the chief seats of power and glory in what she supposed to be the new world kingdom that Christ would set up. Then he asked them the text, "Ye know not what ye ask. Are ye able to drink of the cup that I shall drink of? . . . They say unto him, We are able."

Ob, faint heart, shrink not. Ob, coward soul, be brave. Ob, weak life, be strong. Ob, wretched one, be glad. Ob, sin-sick one, be healed. Ob, failing one, be victorious. Ob, sin-entrained heart, be free. There is power in the cup. State Health Board to Clean Summer Resorts

SALEM, Dec. 6.—Before the beginning of another summer season, the state board of health purpose of formulating definite rules and regulations covering all the summer resorts in Oregon, particularly the various springs throughout the state.

It far too frequently has been that people who have gone to these various resorts in search of health and rest during the summer season have been infected with typhoid fever or other enteric diseases, or, if escaping these, have been compelled to endure annoyances disagreeable in this enlightened age of civilization.
The most flagrant offense is in the matter of the toilet facilities, which at many of the springs are not only an unsightly abomination, but one that is a menace to the health of the public. It frequently happens that at these various springs, after taking their own water supply from the headwaters of some of the streams of the state, the outbuildings are so constructed that the excrement is allowed to flow directly into the stream to poison those who would take water from below.
Many toilets form an active breeding place for flies; numerous hotels have no screens of any kind either to the windows of the bed rooms or even the dining rooms, where a continuous trail of contamination exists from these "common carriers," and in almost none is any attempt made for any sanitary disposal of garbage or kitchen waste.
That this is one of the crying needs, not only in this, but our adjoining state to the north, has been manifest for some time, and it is the board's purpose to not only formulate rules and regulations covering the sanitary conditions, but to see that these are actively enforced, and through the power vested in it will either make all these resorts comply with the rules or close them to the public.

Tomorrow Tuberculosis Day Throughout Nation

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 6.—Churches, schools, labor unions, fraternal orders and other organizations all over the country to the number of 200,000 today completed plans for the observance tomorrow of the Fourth International Tuberculosis Day, designated by the national association for the study and prevention of tuberculosis. More than 1,000 anti-tuberculosis societies throughout the United States will be in charge of tomorrow's ceremonies. Thousands of ministers and occupants of pulpits of all creeds have been asked to include mention of the celebration in their sermons and addresses.

Last year more than 40,000 churches alone formally observed Tuberculosis Day. Officers of the national association said today they have been given assurances from more than 100,000 churches that the day will be observed formally this year. Schools and institutions of all kind have planned to continue the

observance of the celebration during the coming week. The national association hopes by this movement to so interest the president that a federal tuberculosis day will be designated.
Three states have been added thus far during the year to the number of states now using either the indeterminate sentence, probation or parole systems. These are Maine, Nevada and Oregon.
