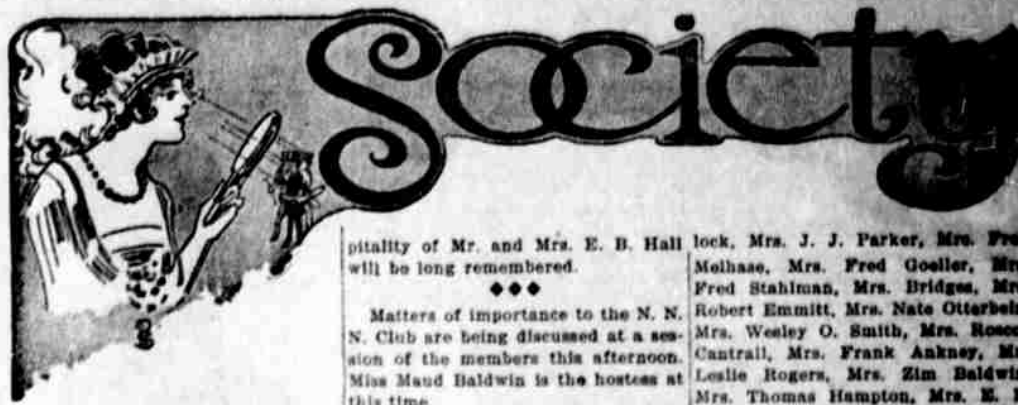

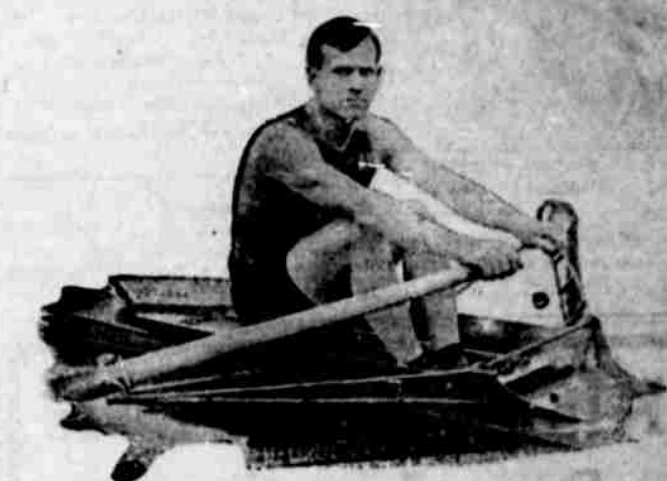

Germany Takes Health Steps

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 5.—In consequence of the prohibition by the German police of the importation from Russia and sale of caviar prepared with formaldehyde or other preservatives, hundreds of Russians engaged in the caviar trade today are threatened with ruin. Germany is Russia's greatest caviar customer. As a result of the strict pure food law police restriction against caviar in Germany, the export to that country has decreased about 100,000 pounds in the last few months.

May Coach California College
