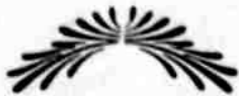

MURPHY, KELLOGG CONTRACT ENDING

"CON" REPORTS EXCAVATION IS MORE THAN HALF FINISHED, AND WILL BE COMPLETED BY CHRISTMAS

Con Murphy is in today from the Tule Lake country, where, with J. W. Kellogg, he has the contract for excavating a big portion of the Adams canal enlargement. He says the job is more than half finished, and will be completed before Christmas.

A force of several men and fourteen teams is engaged in the work.

To Fight Algette Law
When Mrs. H. K. Shafer of El Reno, Okla., arrived at New Orleans on her return from Panama the algette she wore was seized by customs officials. She protested on the ground that she had purchased the costly algette in this country before sailing for Panama, and as there is no law against the sale of algettes in the United States, the seizure was illegal. Her husband proposes to test the constitutionality of the law.

Aid for Strap-Hangers
Senator Norris of Montana has introduced a bill for the relief of the "strap-hangers" in street cars in the District of Columbia. His bill provides that any person entering a car and not being provided with a seat shall be given a rebate check. Two of these checks will be good for one fare.

Little Stories of Interest From Yesterday's Last News

Washington—Motion pictures, showing vivisection of animals and the torture the victims undergo, were a feature of the second day's session of the anti-vivisection convention.

Panama—Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt and Miss Margaret Roosevelt inspected the Panama canal as the guests of Secretary Bishop. They sail for New York Thursday.

Denver—It will be at least ten days before any funerals can be held here. Owing to the terrific storm just passed it is impossible to reach the cemetery, and men cannot dig the graves in the frozen ground. In many cases it is even impossible to take the dead to the undertakers.

Washington—The Hetch Hetchy bill has reached the White House. Congressman Baker of California predicts that it will become a law in less than three days.

San Francisco—Trial of the officers of the Western Fuel company was started before Federal Judge Dooling. The work of empanelling the jury is under way. The company is accused of having a system of short weighing.

Mrs. Wilson Will Help United Press Service
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 16.—Mrs. Woodrow Wilson and scores of women prominent in governmental social circles planned to take an active part in the social welfare work to be undertaken by the Women's Clinic Auxiliary, which opened its sessions

here today. The auxiliary plans to care for working women who cannot afford to go to hospitals or pay fancy prices to physicians.

Asks Large Salary
Having accepted the throne of Albania, the Prince of Weid demands a salary of \$500,000 a year, and in addition insists upon an allowance to keep up his court. His present salary is \$30,000. Austria and Italy are said to agree with his demands, regardless of the poverty of Albania.

Another Custom Shattered
Announcement is made that there will be no New Year reception at the White House during the holiday recess of congress. President Wilson issues a statement saying that as congress has been in continuous session he has had no vacation, and he will rest for a few days during the Christmas holidays, and will depart from the annual custom of holding a reception on New Year's Day.

No Politics There
At a meeting of the Women's Auxiliary of the Foreign Missionary Society of the First Methodist church of Minneapolis, Mrs. W. H. Ramsey was re-elected for the eighteenth time, the society only having had two presidents in forty years, which shows how little politics there is in missionary work.

The telegram followed the receipt of tidings from the Herald's Salem representative that the fifth member of the commission had not been named as yet. Eastern Oregon is entitled to two members.

A meeting of the directors and a large number of members was at once held to take up the matter of urging representation, and E. H. Hall was unanimously chosen. He has always been active in the advancement and protection of the sportsmen's interests, and being familiar with all parts of Southeastern Oregon, would make an ideal commissioner.

Charles F. Stone, member of the former commission, was asked to again serve if appointed, but he flatly refused. Stone, with two other members, resigned because Commissioner Kinney was not removed, and he told the sportsmen he would not serve on a committee with the Rogue River Valley member.
