LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

Editor Herald:
It is a pleasure to know that we
have a governor who takes enough
interest in the unemployed to try to
find them a job. This is evident from
his letter in your paper of Thursday,
last week, in which he states that
there are many men out of work in
Portland, and he asks all who may
want to hire help in this part of the
country to let him know, stating
wages, condition of work, etc., and
he will get them what help they need.

There is no doubt that the governor
is prompted to this action by the
most noble impulse born in the brains
of man—that of ameliorating the suf-
fering of his fellowmen. But as to
the wisdom of the move I, for one,
am in doubt. The governor should
know that at this time of the year
Klamath Falls and vicinity has plenty
of idle men of her own. The farmers
do not need any help in winter to
speak of. Most of the mills and lum-
ber camps have now shut down, and
what few establishments are running
here in winter time can easily get
several men for every one they need
from among our own people, who
have their homes and families here.
There could be only one reason for
anyone sending to Portland for help,
and that is if they could be hired for
less money than what our own peo-
ple are used to get. However, I do
not think that many of the employers
here would take advantage of this
chance to force down wages. The in-
dustries of Klamath Falls are as yet
in their infancy, and it may take
many years before they reach the
coupon clipping stage. The owners
of the plants or business often work
side by side with their workmen as
foremen or superintendents. They
know the needs of their men, and, as
a rule, there is the most cordial feel-
ing between the employers and their
men.

Of course, there are exceptions to
all rules, and according to the rules of
the society we live in the meanness
of the employers sets the pace for the
better ones. For instance, suppose
here were two transfer companies do-
ing business, and that one had a
chance to hire men from Portland at

\$1.50 per day. Naturally they could
do work cheaper than the other con-
cern, who pays \$2 or \$2.50 per day.
It follows, too, that they would get
the bulk of the business, and the ten-
dency would be that the concern who
paid the higher wages would have to
cut them in order to compete or go to
the wall.

It seems, then, that the governor's
efforts to find work for men in a mar-
ket which is already overcrowded, can
only result—if it results in anything
—in the lowering of wages, which
means a lower standard of living for
the workers. I can only think of one
real solution for the unemployed
problem, which is the one proposed
by the socialists: The organization of
society on the co-operative plan, and
by making all the people part owners
in the mills, shops and land, and by
producing goods for use, instead of
for profit.

If it then should happen that they
had produced more than enough to
supply the needs of all they could
vote to take a vacation on full rat-
ions. I do not know how this propo-
sition appeals to our governor, but I
believe if he will study the socialist
philosophy carefully it will appeal to
him as it has to all who desire to es-
tablish justice on earth, and peace
and happiness among mankind.
