"Forgiveness"

for First Presbyterian Church By R. J. S. Stablefield, Past

And David said unto Nathan, I have sinned against the Lord. And Nathan said unto David, The Lord also hath put away thy sin. II Samuel, 12:13

The word forgiveness is not found in our text, but the phrase, "put away thy sin" expresses very perfectly the later Hebrew conception of forgiveness.
