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FUEL SHORTAGES WILL TELL OF EXPOSED IN CASE

PROSECUTOR SULLIVAN SHOWS WONDERFUL INCREASE OF WEIGHT IN ANTHRACITE PUT IN BUNKERS

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 15.—In outlining the government's case against the Western Fuel company, Prosecutor Sullivan today alleged that the company sold 13,974 tons of coal more than was received between April 1, 1906, and December 31, 1912. He declared his intention to show the company kept a special set of books showing the short weights. He also asserted that naval officers, customs officials and steamship engineers received gifts of money from the company.

Mrs. Becker, wife of the police lieutenant of New York charged with the murder of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler killed more than a year ago, was an interested spectator at the court of appeals in Albany, the capital of the state, when the question of a new trial for her husband was under consideration.

The court of appeals is the highest court of the state, and its decision on the question of the legality and regularity of the decisions of Supreme Court Justice Goff, the trial judge before whom Becker was convicted, will be final. Mrs. Becker showed by every action that she has faith not only in her husband's acquittal, but in his innocence. Before she was married to him she was a school teacher, and the strength she exercised in the class room has not been lost in her last year of trial.
