Bombardier Wells Introduces New Training Stunt



Bombardier Wells, the champion of Great Britain, introduced a new training stunt in preparation for his fight with George Carpenter before the National Sporting Club in London. He got four pretty boxers and had them stand in front of him at one time for his boxing exercise. He had them go after him one after the other, Repelling one with all the cleverness and speed he possessed, and despite the fact that Wells was knocked out by Al Palmer and Gunboat Smith here, and was knocked out by Carpenter in less than one round, he was acknow-

ledged to be a very fine boxer—he had the next man jump for him. In this way he was able to take on two men, or even four, during three minutes, and was thus forced to work much faster than those boxers who take on the same sparring partner for two or three rounds before changing to a fresh man.

The four men facing Wells in the illustration were Stoker Smith, Sid Wells, Pat O'Keefe and Alf Wells.

Of these Pat O'Keefe is well known in this country. He was brought here several years ago by Charley Harvey,

now secretary of the New York State Boxing Commission. Pat was sent against the best middleweights of the country, and was invariably beaten. The best that could be said of him was that he was absolutely game. It is doubtful if even Wells, who hits pretty hard, has a punch good enough to put Pat out.

Wells' methods may be adopted by fast American boxers. It certainly would add to the speed of such men as Paddy McFarland and Willie Ritchie, though they are pretty fast now.

Chinese to Organize a Christian Church

NANKING, Dec. 17.—Chinese Christians to the number of 170 today took preliminary steps toward the organization of a Christian church, to be free of foreign control.

At a called meeting of the Nanking Evangelical Association they decided to found such a church to meet the wants of the students of Christianity, and to draw into the church all educated young men who profess to be Christians, but who do not attend any of the existing churches.

This action is the outcome of a re-

vival which foreign missionaries held here last spring. Thousands of Chinese attended and 400 signed cards to indicate their desire to study Christianity.

One hundred and seventy of these objected to joining churches which were dominated by foreigners. The plan to organize a native controlled church followed.

The foreign missionary body held several discussions over the action and appointed a committee to assist the Chinese in drawing up the necessary constitution.

Battling Levinsky Light Heavyweight



There are fight fans who insist that Battling Levinsky is a new Joe Choyinski, and Choyinski made all the heavyweights sit up and take notice when he was in his prime. Levinsky was an obscure Philadelphia fighter till Dan Morgan found him. Dan is the finder of K. O. Brown and some others who have made fortunes, if they have not won titles in the ring. Levinsky is undoubtedly clever. Else how could he stand off such a boxer as McGorty? He did that.

Weighing in the neighborhood of 160 pounds, the young Philadelphian has defeated men who tip the beam near 200 pounds, and although he has taken part in about sixty contests, he has never been knocked off his feet.

Levinsky has already been coming along at a remarkable gait, and he has won the admiration of the fans by his clean fighting and his willingness to fight anybody whom his manager selects for him, be he white or black or of any weight. They all look alike to Philadelphia's "Ghetto Champion," and he may carve a wide swath through the ranks of "White Hopes."

CARDINAL'S DEATH AFFECTS PONTIFF

PIUS HAD HOPED RAMPULLA WOULD BE CHOSEN AS HIS SUCCESSOR—LEARNED OF DEMISE TODAY

ROME, Dec. 17.—The effect of the death of Cardinal Rampulla, the intimate friend and counsellor of Pope Pius, is feared somewhat by the pontiff's physicians.

It is understood that the pope hoped Rampulla would be his successor, should he die soon. Cardinal Oreglia, who was dean of the College of Cardinals, and who died a few days ago, was also most intimate with the pope.

The news of the death of Cardinal Rampulla was kept from the ears of Pope Pius until this morning. When he learned of it he fell on his knees and prayed.

"It is God's will," he said a little later, when he rose. At once he retired to his chapel to say a mass.

Courtroom Wanted

PARIS, Dec. 17.—The French government today is looking for quarters to serve as a juvenile court, patterned after the American model originated by Judge Lindsey. The chamber of deputies passed an act in July, 1913, providing for such a court, but neglected to provide either funds to operate it or a room for it to be held in. Paris courts are already overcrowded, so a separate building must be arranged for.
