INDIAN SUSTAINS
QUEER ACCIDENT

UNUSUAL DISLOCATION OF BONE
IN ARCH OF FOOT JUST BELOW
ANKLE FROM A FALL FROM A
HORSE

(Herald Special Service)

FORT KLAMATH, Dec. 18.—In
the arch of the foot, just below the
ankle joint, is a bone about 2 1/2
inches long and about 1 1/2 inches
wide. It is called the astragalus.
It has a rough surface, and is
held by powerful ligaments, still en-
ters into the formation of a rather
movable joint, and although rarely
dislocated, yet is a serious problem
when dislocated from its socket.

Fred Johnson, an Indian at Klamath
Agency, received such a disloca-
tion of the ankle, and is of interest
because of the rarity of such a mis-
hap. The misfortune happened on
having a horse stumble, falling on his
leg before he could withdraw it from
the stirrup.

To correct his foot, an open opera-
tion was required, and an inch of the
bone amputated by Dr. A. A. Soule.
Levers, pulleys and manipulations
were of no avail. The patient is now
resting well, and it is hoped no am-
putation of the foot will later be re-
quired, on account of septic infection.

Trial of Moriarty
Starts in the East

TOMB RIVER, N. J., Dec. 18.—

Charged with the murder of Mrs.

Marie Turner, wife of a gardener on

the estate of George Gould, Joseph

Moriarty, alias William H. Leeban,

was sent on trial for his life.

Moriarty is practically penniless.

His attorneys were retained by Mrs.

Joseph Lynch, wealthy society woman

of New York, who has interested her-
self in the defendant's case, and be-
lieves him the victim of a conspiracy.

Moriarty is 33 years of age, and

has a wife and child. He has been

confined in the Ocean county jail since

his arrest last April at Fort Lee,

N. J., by Sheriff Frank Tilton, after

a sensational hunt for the murderer.

A bitter fight by the defense is ex-
pected when the prosecution expects
to produce evidence, dictograph re-
cords of conversations Moriarty is
said to have had with a Catholic
priest in his cell here.

The crime of which Moriarty

stands accused was committed April

28, 1911. On the afternoon of that

day Mrs. Turner left her home to de-
liver some dresses she had made. Her

body, badly mutilated, was found in
a wooded valley, late in the afternoon

two days later.

A huge club, covered with blood

and hair, lay near the body.

Detectives from the Schindler

agency were employed and one year

later they fastened suspicion on

Moriarty, who at one time had been

employed near here as a stenogra-
pher for Mrs. Lynch.

Detectives enticed Moriarty into

New Jersey, and Sheriff Tilton ar-
rested him.

He has steadfastly maintained his

innocence. Mrs. Lynch declared her

belief that Mrs. Turner was killed by

a speeding automobile and her body

carried into the woods to divert sus-
picion.
