GOVERNMENT ANNOUNCES MEDALS FOR CIVIL, INDIAN, SPANISH-AMERICAN AND PHILIPPINE VETERANS

C., Jan. 2.—The war department announced today that it is ready to receive applications for campaign badges from soldiers who can show service in the civil, Indian and Spanish wars, the Philippine insurrection and the Chinese relief expedition. The badges are in reality medals, coined by the Philadelphia mint.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 2.—The oft-repeated statement by Leach Cross that Anderson was away out of his class when he mixed with him, or any of the other boys in the lightweight division who were close to the top, was proven yesterday afternoon. The bout between the Hebrew dentist and the Vancouver boy was stopped in the seventh round by the referee, after Bud had repeatedly hit the floor.

Right from the start, the bout was "Cross". He landed almost at will, and it is certain that had the bout gone another round, Anderson would have received a second knockout at the hands of the dentist.

The battle between the two on July 4th was held not to have been a fair chance for Anderson, as he was operated on for appendicitis the following day. It was generally conceded that yesterday's battle was Bud's chance to prove whether he was made of championship timber, or only a good second-rater—clean, manly and square, but a little too slow for the fastest company.

U. of O's. Extension Work Can't Be Excelled

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 2.—Beginning a policy of extension work that will carry higher education into every corner of the state by lectures of members of the faculty, by increased number of correspondence courses, and the establishment of research departments with experts in municipal affairs, sanitary engineering, civic biology and educational state committees in solving their problems, the University of Oregon this year has embarked in a carry-the-school-to-the-public policy which has heretofore been impossible.

There are 1784 students enrolled in the various schools of the university this year. The law school and the medical school in Portland report an enrollment of 251 and 78 respectively. Fifteen new members have been added to the faculty. An increase in structures in the departments of engineering, mathematics, education, history, journalism and psychology has been made, and the new department of Scandinavian languages created.

In Dr. Clifford Freeman Hodge, Dr. George Rebec, Don C. Sowers and W. D. Allison the university has a quartet of experts of national reputation to go to every community in the state where there is a demand for them, and help communities in the problems. Dr. Hodge is the Clark University biologist who has created his own subject, "Civic Biology," teaching people what forms of animals and

vegetable life to foster and what kinds to destroy. In the spring Dr. Hodge will start on a crusade with the aid of the school children of the state which he says will make Oregon a hygienic state.

Dr. George Rebec came out to Oregon from the University of Michigan to live on his farm near Medford, but was hunted out and persuaded by President Campbell to join the extension department. Dr. Rebec's specialty is methods and administration of education. Don C. Sowers, has been on the Oregon faculty only a short time, but already he has made a study of the proposed budget of the city of Eugene, and has shown the people that a 12½ mill levy on the assessable property of Eugene will cover the proposed expenses for the coming year.

Previous to his study it was believed that a 15 mill levy would have to be raised. Professor Sowers is known as the municipal expert, and will have charge of the contemplated municipal reference library. W. D. Allison is a sanitary engineer brought to the university for work in the extension department as an adviser for state communities in problems of sanitation.

Carnegie Uses Little Steel in Own Building

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 2.—The Carnegie Institute's new building, equipped for the study of terrestrial magnetism, was made ready for occupancy today. It is a structure absolutely unique in buildings. The smallest possible amount of steel conducive to safety was used in the construction, as steel would affect the delicate magnetic instruments to be housed in the structure.

Moreover, the specifications called for a building without vibration, as near as possible, and the contractors sought to accomplish this by a construction unusual in buildings. Cross walls of the building have been literally hung from concrete girders, and the piers of the foundation have been packed in sand.

It will be at least six weeks before all the delicate instruments used by the institution can be installed and made ready for use.
