

Women's Votes Make San Luis Obispo Wet

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Jan. 3.—Under a ballot decision offering an interesting commentary on woman's suffrage in one California city, San Luis Obispo today its 143d consecutive year as a "wet" center.

Two years ago, after a desperate fight, the "wets" carried the city by the narrow majority of 86 votes.

Since that election women in California have been enfranchised, and

the prohibition element approached the polls December 9th confident that women voters would put an end to the "wet" ascendancy that dated from the Spanish days of California.

The count of the votes, however, provided a surprise for both factions. Not even the most sanguine liquor supporter expected the overwhelming defeat of the "dry" forces, which was accomplished with a margin of 109 votes.

President Wilson has appointed Mrs. Cora Sharp postmaster at Foraker, in Osage county, Okla., to succeed State Senator William H. Dutton, who resigned to locate in Missouri. Mrs. Sharp won the appointment in a competitive examination, defeating several other contestants.

At their annual meeting in New York city the directors of the National League of Baseball Clubs, made up of the presidents of the eight clubs in the league, elected Governor John K. Tener of Pennsylvania their league president for a term of four years. They are said to have agreed on a salary of \$25,000 a year. The governor

will not take active charge until January 1, 1915. In the meantime John N. Heydler, secretary of the league, will act for him in matters of detail. Mrs. Britton, though owner of the St. Louis Club, did not, of course, vote in the annual meeting, for the National League does not yet recognize suffragettes. But her husband, who is president of her club, voted, and it is

believed he voted the way she wanted. For there were eight votes for Governor Tener. The presence of Hempstead, president of the Giants, and of Mrs. Britton was an indication of the age of the league. 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OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"The Value of a Good Resolution"

"I will arise and go to my father," Luke 15:18.

Our text tells us of a good resolution the prodigal son made. At this

season of the year many people make good resolutions, but not so many as formerly. The making of New Year resolutions has to a certain extent gone out of style.

What do you think of New Year resolutions? Did you make a good resolution to be-

gin the year with? Some people do not like to make good resolutions to begin the year with, or at another time. They feel that they can get along very well without them. Some really feel that a good resolution actually has an element of danger in it. They would rather not make a good resolution than to take the risk of making it and then not living up to it. The Bible says, "Better is it that thou shouldst not vow than that thou shouldst vow and not pay." This is a quotation that many of us who do not like to assume the responsibility of making good resolutions hide behind, but when Solomon uttered these words he was speaking about fools. He said, "A fool's voice is known by multitude of words." This refers to the person who makes his resolutions with his mouth and

not with his will. One reason that good resolutions are looked down upon today is that so many of them are made only with the mouth. The prodigal son's good resolution marked the turning point in his life. No doubt he had been thinking about his father ever since he lost all his money. Perhaps he had been wishing he had some of the bread his father gave to the servants ever since he began living on husks, but all these thoughts and wishes never took him one step toward his father's home. A resolution is the only thing in the world that can turn desire into action. Every upward step that man has taken has rested upon some good resolution.

Jesus emphasized the importance of a good resolution as no other person ever did. He made salvation hinge upon a definite act of the will. He never accepted a person who simply said he had thought about following. Neither did he accept those who said they desired to follow, but only those who said, "I will." Are you afraid that you might break a good resolution if you should make it? Well, your reward does not depend on your success, but upon the effort you put forth, for the effort you put forth measures your faithfulness. Peter made a good resolution and failed to carry it out, but Jesus did not condemn him, for he knew the failure was due to the weakness of the flesh. If you make a good resolution and put forth an honest effort to live up to it, you need not fear the result.
