

Says Parents Dispose of Children in Berlin

BERLIN, Jan. 3.—Startling revelations concerning child traffic in Germany are contained in a book published today by Mme. Henrietta Arendt of Stuttgart. She charges that the sale of children goes on uninterruptedly with the silent consent of public opinion, parents actually disposing of them to the highest bidder among better-situated childless families.

In a single month she collected 227 advertisements inserted in the newspapers by persons offering to sell or "adopt" children. As many of the little ones are "adopted" merely for future exploitation, it really means a slave traffic of the most remarkable character, says Mme. Arendt.

In a number of the papers the advertisements regarding children are interspersed with those for the sale of cattle and pigs.

at that moment that I would indeed be glad if everybody could think of me as I think of the departed," said Fred Mills. "He was a man who won out in spite of oppression. He was a man who kept his agreement, and consequently, his verbal statement was as good with any who knew him as a written record."

"If our talks can be a source of encouragement to anybody living, they have not been in vain," said W. J. Shaver. "Any more than was the life of Mr. Keesee lived in vain. He was a typical American, and in his passing, Klamath Falls mourns a man who served her with loyalty and high purposes, endeavoring himself to all who knew him as a man of high intelligence. His record as a man of honesty will serve as a halo of glory and an everlasting benediction among those who knew modest and unassuming Henry W. Keesee."

"If the medal of the Legion of Honor was ever due a member of the Klamath county bar, it is due to Mr. Keesee," said Judge Benson. "He had no faults, only a weakness, and in the last years of his life, he put up one of the finest fights against this that ever took place on a battlefield. He proved that he had the right stuff in him, for he died a victor."

"No body of lawyers could stand up and testify to the integrity of a man if this was not so. They would not dare to lie in such a manner about a man who had been the least bit crooked. Our friend was a man true to his friends and his clients, and there is none of us but hopes when we have gone out, people will have an actual, sincere regret, and say kind things to men about us, as in this case."

"The measuring of a lawyer's success by the multiplicity of his fees is an awful mistake. The successful lawyer is one like our departed friend, of whom his fellow lawyers will say 'he was an honest man.' A lofty code of ethics, such as his, is an absolute measure. One can be hungry and shabby, but he cannot afford to break faith with his honesty and integrity if he is to be a successful lawyer."

"If Henry Keesee accomplished nothing else but to burn into your souls the principles of integrity and honesty, his life was a great success. With all of his battles, his trials and tribulations, I would rather have his record for professional honesty follow me to the grave than to amass a million."

BERNE, Switzerland, Jan. 12.—In the near future Switzerland will very likely present to the powers a request that in the event of a great European war all of Switzerland be constituted into a Red Cross camp for the care of the wounded of all the nations involved. This, Switzerland is now convinced, is the only way that not only her neutrality, but her very existence could be preserved.

Although the neutrality of Switzerland is guaranteed by the leading powers, the Swiss government has recently become convinced that unless she has some actual way of insuring on the respecting of this neutrality, that in a war between any of the four great powers surrounding her this guarantee would amount to very little. In addition, she is also convinced that the first step in any European war would be the prohibition by all the powers involved of the exports of coal and provisions which they would need for their own armies. As Switzerland is entirely dependent on the surrounding powers not only for her coal, but for her grain and practically all of her food supply, the cutting off of these imports would reduce the entire country to starvation within a few weeks.

It is in the hopes of exacting a guarantee from all of the four powers surrounding her not to interrupt these imports in case of war that Switzerland is considering the project of having the entire country declared a great international Red Cross camp, and to undertake the care of the wounded of all nations in the event of any general European war. Members of the Swiss government who are backing the movement declare that this would not only insure for Switzerland the neutrality and all of the protection that is accorded by international agreement to the Red Cross camps in time of war, but it would also insure that her industries would not be ruined by the cutting off of the coal supply and her population reduced to starvation by the stopping of food imports.

The treaty to be submitted to the powers will provide that as fast as the wounded are cured they will be returned to their respective countries. This, Switzerland is convinced, would be of enough importance to any of the powers engaged in a European war to make certain that none of them would violate her neutrality by crossing the boundary with one of its armies or interfere with her food supply.
