

WASHINGTON DRY CAMPAIGN IS ON

STATEWIDE CLAMOR WILL BE ONE OF THE MEASURES TO GO ON THE BALLOT AT THE NEXT ELECTION

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 5.—A campaign for statewide prohibition was begun here today with the circulation of petitions to place the measure on the ballot at the next election. It will take practically 4,000 signatures to bring the measure before the people, but as hundreds have volunteered to aid in the work of circulating the petitions, it was believed sufficient names would easily be secured. The measure was drawn up by L. E. Kirkpatrick, who enlisted the aid of some of the best constitutional lawyers in the state, so as to obviate any chance of legal complications later. It has the approval of officers of temperance and reform organizations.

Why Not H.C.L.? Women Threw Good Suet Away

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 5.—Reports from some of the food specialists of the department of agriculture indicate that in certain sections there is a serious waste of a valuable food, due to the fact that many housewives do not appreciate the value of suet in cooking, and do not know how to use it. As a result many throw good food suet into the garbage pail, or else in rare cases use it with meat trimmings for soap making. Many are unaware that suet possesses the same food value as lard, and if properly tried out is a satisfactory substitute for frying purposes, for shortening, and in making savory fats. Apparently some of the cook books have misled the American housewife by stating that suet is good only for soap making. In Europe, however, this food is carefully kept and rendered, and in Germany suet and lard are used interchangeably for frying and shortening.

Suet is the hard fat about the kidneys and loins in beef and mutton which correspond to the fat of hogs from which leaf lard is made. Those who do not know how to render it object to the hardness of suet, and to its special flavor. Fresh suet, however, can be so rendered as to make a soft, usable fat, practically free from any distinctive flavor or odor.

The following is the simplest method for trying out suet:

Remove the skin and lean parts from beef fats and cut it into small pieces. Put it into a saucepan and cover it with cold water. Place it on the stove uncovered, so that the steam may carry off any disagreeable flavor. When the water has nearly all evaporated, set the kettle back and let the fat slowly try out. When the fat has ceased bubbling and the scraps of skin are shriveled, allow the scraps to settle at the bottom of the kettle, strain the fat through a cloth and set it away to cool.

Famous Russian Dancer Having Constant Struggle Against Fat



Mme. Lydia Kyasht, famed as the most graceful of Russian dancers, except Pavlova, has a constant fight to keep thin, despite the energy of her exercise on the stage. Most dancers work hard enough to remain thin, some of them very thin. But not this one.

"I eat only one meal a day," said she. "That I take about 3 o'clock in the afternoon, except on those days when I give matinees. Then I must eat earlier than the food may be digested before my dance."

"There is something else I must do to fight the fat," she continued. "I take exercise walking up and down a ladder. You ought to try it if you wish to lose flesh. It is very effective."

Madame Kyasht began her dancing career when she was 8 years of age. She was taken into the imperial school for dancers at St. Petersburg then, and has continued her exercise and her practice ever since. Dancers, she said, are not made in a day; they grow.

LIVESTOCK MART ON STEADY BASE

OUTLOOK FOR 1914 IS EXCEEDINGLY BRIGHT—CATTLE MARKET HAS BEEN SHOWING MORE STRENGTH

PORTLAND, Jan. 5.—Livestock liquidation during the last week of 1913 was light, as is customary; the bulk of shippers planned to spend the holidays at home, and postponed coming to market until early in the new year.

The cattle trade has been showing considerable strength recently, as killers have been busy clearing up their mid-December surplus. The demand for beef is not strong enough, however, to elevate prices on poor stuff, and only the prices of grade have advanced.

Beef steers sold from \$7.75 to \$8.10, with the bulk at about \$7.90 to \$7.90. Butcher stock has a slow time, as supply contained very little choice material. Cows at \$6.80, heifers at \$7, bulls at \$5.50 to \$5.75, and calves at \$7.50 to \$9, are the top quotations.

The swine market took a sudden upward trend, and even touched \$8, although \$7.90 was a liberal top for bulk of prime light hogs the early part of the week.

Receipts were light and Monday's run was the smallest in months, but 11 loads came into the open market Friday and tops moved freely at 8 cents.

The sheep house filled up early in the week, but has been depleted since. Fancy lambs selling at \$6.35 featured.

Mutton business was temporarily dull, due to short receipts, and the majority of transactions consisted of mixed stuff.

Generally sheep and lambs, hogs and cattle are all on a steady basis for the new year.

Municipal Water Cart Latest in Pittsburgh

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 5.—Pittsburg today officially established a municipal water cart. Its peripatations will be personally conducted by R. H. Jackson, Smoketown's new district attorney. Onto this first municipal water wagon of which there is a record, today climbed all the assistant district attorneys, members of the district attorney's detective force, and all clerks and court room attaches who were appointed by District Attorney Jackson. They had to clamber aboard if they wanted the jobs, which pay all the way from \$1,500 to \$6,000 a year.

As each employee was inducted into office and handed his papers he in turn handed the district attorney his resignation. All the resignations were carefully filed away by Jackson, who will allow them to become dusty and moth-eaten if none of the water wagon coterie falls off the aqua cart. The first time any member of Jackson's staff falls off or climbs off the wagon "just to get the whip," that tottering individual's resignation will be pulled from the files and accepted. Today marked also the re-entrance into control of the Penrose-Oliver municipal machine, Joseph G. Armstrong succeeding William Magee as mayor.
