FOURTH TRIAL OF HYDE IS ON

FAMOUS CASE OF MAN ACCUSED
OF POISONING ECCENTRIC MIL-
LIONAIRE IS AGAIN BEFORE
THE COURT.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 5.—The fourth annual trial of Dr. B. Clark Hyde for the murder of Millionaire Thomas H. Swope of Independence, was scheduled to begin here today before Judge E. E. Porterfield, in the criminal court. This trial promised to differ from the others in that United States Senator James A. Reed is not assisting in the prosecution. Reed officiated three times.

Hyde, a prominent physician who married the niece of Swope, was indicted for killing the eccentric millionaire, his cousin and nephew, with cyanide of potassium, and with poisoning the whole Swope family, their servants and friends visiting in the house, with typhus germs injected in their food, milk and drinking water. In the first trial Hyde was convicted.

The Missouri supreme court reversed and remanded the case, affirming more than fifty errors alleged by the defense, and scoring the prosecution and presiding judge.

The next trial a juror went insane and climbed out the transom. A mistrial was declared. On the third trial the jury disagreed, and another trial was ordered.

CACKA PLEADS GUILTY TODAY

MAN ARRESTED FOR LOOTING

Through his attorneys, W. H. Shaw and C. M. O'Neill, he entered a plea of guilty, and was fined \$30 and the costs of the suit.

Cacka was caught in the act of carrying things away from a machine by Oscar Lyons, who laid in wait for him.

Prosecuting Attorney John Irwin moved for the dismissal of the charge against Adolf Cacka, Frank's brother, arrested at the same time. He was at the house at the time, and nothing was found to connect him with the robberies.

First Swimmer to Go Length of Canal



Captain Alfred Brown, the first swimmer to go the whole length of the Panama canal, came back to the United States today. He said that during the time he was in the water he was caught again and again in swift currents and whirlpools made by the water flowing from the locks on the Atlantic side, and once his legs became entangled in the branches of a submerged tree in Gatun Locks, and for a moment he thought he had been seized by an octopus.

Captain Brown said that the arrangements for swimming the canal were made possible by the kindness of Colonel Goethals, in charge of the zone. It was on the morning of November 23 when the captain entered the water of Colon harbor. The locks were filled and opened for him, and he swam through, followed by a motorboat carrying attendants. On the first day he swam twenty-four miles through the locks and Culebra cut, and, starting at 5 o'clock on the morning of the 24th he swam from Gamboa to Balboa on the Pacific.

He was in the water 24 hours and 25 minutes, and covered 41 miles—24 the first day and 17 the second. The excessive heat was the hardest thing to combat, and despite the head shield the swimmer wore, the captain said, the sun's rays were almost unbearable. Captain Brown said that he encountered snakes in the lake, and saw odd-looking little animals drop from the branches of some trees, the tops of which were yet out of water.

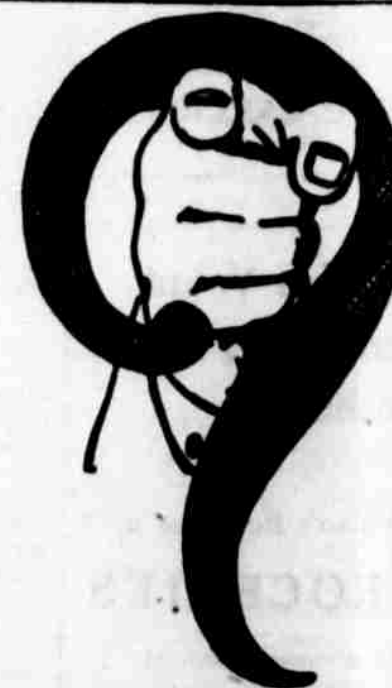
