Eugenic Law Jolted

Wisconsin's eugenic law, which became effective on January 1, will be nullified, according to Horace B. Wamsley, an attorney, practicing before the supreme court of the United States. He declares no service or examination is necessary under the Wisconsin laws. Besides, the doctors have said they would not make the legal examination for a fee of \$3, the amount fixed by the law. Mr. Wamsley quotes the supreme court decision of April, 1912, to prove that parties need no license or examinations to marry.

To Uphold Option Law

In a ruling recently handed down the court of criminal appeals of Oklahoma indicated that it will approve all features of the new law making boot-legging a felony punishable by imprisonment. There are 299 liquor cases now pending on appeal.
