Competitors should register at once upon deciding to take the examination.

They Get One Vote.

Cox Says Ohio Leads All States

Governor Says There Is More Real Progressive Legislation on Its Books Than Even in Oregon

Claiming that Ohio has today on its statute books more real progressive legislation, recently enacted, than many other states of the Union, Governor James M. Cox today outlined through the United Press in the following the program which Ohio's legislature put through.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Jan. 8.—Upon Ohio's statute books today are written fifty-six of the most progressive laws in the nation, evolved from fifty-six campaign pledges to the people of Ohio before the last election. Thanks to a body of men composing Ohio's general assembly, so patriotic in spirit that to oppose the right of the people would be treason, Ohio is enabled today to call herself among the foremost of the states enjoying the freedom of the people's prerogatives. I am grateful for this opportunity to tell the people of the nation what Ohio has already done in the past eventful twelvemonth. Briefly:
The Warnes tax law takes taxation out of politics, creates uniformity and will bring to light every dollar of taxable property in Ohio. It provides an appointive taxing official in every county. Local political bickerings, influences and obligations are effectively eliminated.
The mother's pension law levies a pittance of tax on the comfortable for the benefit of the needy—the mothers and their dependents. It will save many families from want in every one of Ohio's eighty-eight counties the first year. The second year we estimate it will increase in effectiveness 50 per cent.
Ohio's compulsory workmen's compensation law is a step in advance over all of them. It provides a system of claim investigation that defies fraud. It gives both workman and employer a square deal at a negligible cost to each, and clears away masses of costly court litigation. Its compulsory feature affords every workman its benefit and insures protection to his dependents.
The new liquor license act eliminates 3,304 dives and joints. It puts out of business first all of the wine-rooms so frequently patronized by young girls and women, and is a step toward higher morals, less debauchery, white slavery and common evils emanating from the influences of liquor. It brings to light of day a business that has thriven in the dark. It absolutely eliminates objectionable liquor traffic and limits the trade to one saloon for every 500 of population in counties now known as "wet."
Our "blue sky law," operated by the state banking department, abolishes the shaky operations of illegitimate land sharks, wildcat speculations and fake banking institutions. It places sole control in the right place.
Boys under 16 and girls under 18 years of age are barred from health racking employments, an evil so common in most states, by Ohio's newly enacted child labor law.
Ohio today has a general code of good roads laws. Most important is the Hites law, providing for a half mill levy in every county to be used in the construction of twelve main market roads and a system of inter-county roads, connecting every section with a fine paved highway. A sum of \$800,000 is now in the state

treasury waiting to be spent. It provides for the raising of \$3,500,000 annually for ten years. It will free Ohio from mudholes, and provides highways that will reduce the cost of transportation of farm products.

The housewife's market basket is now protected by an act prohibiting combinations to fix prices and providing that violators shall be fined and sent to the state penitentiary. There is also now no loophole for the dealer who uses short measures.

The state has appropriated ample funds to fight the great white slave plague. It has in addition considered the general health precautions more simply than ever before. Upon Ohio's statute books were also placed during the past year, laws granting municipalities the option of home rule in any practical form; creating an efficient industrial commission; eliminating politics through the civil service; adjusting and simplifying court procedure; adequate food protection; providing for a thorough investigation of farm credits; giving the state board of charities general supervision of the care of all dependent, neglected and delinquent children; creating a state penitentiary open air farm to be constructed and worked by convicts; establishing elementary day school for uneducated prisoners in Ohio's penitentiary, fitting the illiterate with stamnia to resist evil when released and face the world with an even break; a drastic anti-lobby law and many more.

The greatest object of my administration will have been accomplished when the legislature this winter adopts a progressive school system endorsed by prominent educators all over the state and lay delegates from every school district, no matter how small. It will provide adequate, thorough and efficient supervision of every school in Ohio, and a high standard will be required of every teacher, old and young.

had not been granted, the department should have exercised its power to relieve contractors and call for new bids, thus giving star route carriers opportunity to bid with full knowledge of the service likely to be required of them. The department has stretched the language of the law in several respects, but has failed to do justice to the star route mail carriers.
"Part of the profits from the parcel post should have been expended in providing wicker hampers to transport articles easily crushed, instead of sending the same in bags such as are used for bundles of letters, newspapers and magazines. Express companies

I look for enormous advancement of the parcel post in the future, but sincerely hope we shall not hasten to enlarge the service and show profits at the expense of private individuals or to the neglect of the best possible charter of service."
