P. O. DIRECTORY BEING COMPILED

BOX RENTERS ARE ASKED TO SUBMIT A LIST OF THOSE ENTITLED TO RECEIVE MAIL THROUGH THEM

Postmaster Delzell is sending out to all holders of postoffice boxes a card to be filled in by the renter, giving a full list of all parties entitled to receive mail therein.

It is preferable to give full names, thus: "John H. Smith," "Mrs. Mary A. Brown," rather than to give the simple initials.

From the list of names received a complete directory will be compiled which will very much facilitate the correct delivery of mail. It is estimated that perhaps 8,000 patrons are served from this office—no small task to carry these names in mind—so help improve the service to all by promptly filling in the cards and returning them to the postoffice.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

What Would You Do?

Editor Herald: Here is a list of news items which I have gathered from yours and other papers in the last few days bearing on the condition of working people: 1,000 hungry people in Portland, Oregon; 2,000 crying for bread in Seattle, Wash.; 20,000 in the same predicament in Los Angeles, Cal.; 150,000 in Chicago; and 200,000 in New York, and the list could be extended indefinitely. It is a conservative estimate that there are at least three and one-half million men, women and children in the United States today who are suffering from hunger and cold, and ten millions more who are lingering on the ragged edge of starvation.

Now we must not expect these starving men and women to solve the problem of unemployment and of providing food and shelter for the nation's workers. Hungry people are not in the right frame of mind to study such problems. It takes wholesome food to produce clear thoughts, and if these people stay hungry too long they may forget to think altogether, and at such times they may do things which will shock the pillars of society and infringe on the sacred rights of private property.

It is up to us, then, who are still enjoying our three meals a day and have a shelter over our heads, to do some serious thinking and try to find a way out, and I feel sure the editor of the Herald will open his pages for such discussion. The cause of this condition is plain enough. Some time ago the principals of the big lumber concerns in California and Oregon held a conference and decided to curtail the output of lumber one third for the next six months. The directors of the steel trust recently decided to cut down the production of steel. Why? Because these gentlemen are wise enough to keep the supply within hailing distance of the demand. They cannot then employ as many men as formerly because there is only a limited sale for their products, and this same condition prevails all along the line until a large part of the nation's workers are idle and in danger of starving to death.

The proposition in a nutshell is this: The owners of the plants can not employ more men until there is more demand for products, and the workers can not buy anything until they get work and earn the wherewithal, so people have to go hungry because they have produced too much food and ill clad because they have made too much clothing!

Joe Cannon once said: "This country is a hell of a success," and really, is it not?

Now as to the solution. You stand-pat republicans and you hide-bound democrats, who believe in competition, even after it has crystallized into a competition for jobs—what is your remedy? If you have one, for the sake of the hungry babies, trot it out that we can see it. If you have none, it is high time you put your brains at work finding one; otherwise the plight of this hungry horde may be yours some day. The socialists' remedy is well known to most of your readers, but for the sake of the others

DEPARTMENT OF RELIGION AT U.

METHODISTS WOULD MAKE AN ENDOWMENT TO ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY FOR SUCH AN INSTITUTION

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Jan. 8.—A denominational religious department in connection with a state university is the unique scheme being perfected today by Methodist leaders of Illinois who are working in conjunction with the officials of the University of Illinois here.

Within a few months the Wesley foundation will consist of a \$100,000 endowment fund for this purpose, according to announcement of Executive Secretary McGannon today.

The Wesley foundation is incorporated under the laws of Illinois. Courses in religious instruction by prominent Methodist divines and theologians will be offered to regular students of the university, and due credit given by the university for the work done. Bachelors degrees will be given for courses combined from the Methodist department and other departments of the university.

The foundation fund and the supervision of the courses is in the hands of a board of thirteen trustees. The officers of the board are Bishop W. F. McDowell, Chicago, chairman; District Superintendent P. B. Madden, Champaign, vice president; Jessie B. Danley, Chicago, secretary, and Dr. C. B. Taylor, Champaign, treasurer.

A local executive committee, with residence at the university, consists of John W. Stipes, F. H. Rogers, P. B. Madden, James C. Baker, J. W. Van Cleave, all leading Methodist ministers in the state.
