

OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"Prayer"

Luke 11:1 "Lord teach us to pray." Last evening closed perhaps one of the greatest weeks of united prayer that this city has ever witnessed. Shall we notice the privilege of prayer? The privilege of prayer is the privilege of the child of God. The child of God is not that of the arrow, the canon ball, the earth's orbital velocity, or a shaft of light, but the breath of prayer on a Christian's lips. This breath of prayer is a wireless message to the ear of God, and receives answer in a moment of time. The mightiest force is not any of the six mechanical powers, the rush of the cyclone, the lift of the tides or the tug of gravitation. Prayer has outstripped these in mighty accomplishments. By it, battles have been won, diseases stayed, hunger and thirst appeased, hearts healed, the devil overcome and heaven opened. The sweetest music is not that of the Aeolian harp, great organ or the song of the morning stars, but the harmony of a soul in communion with its Maker. The most eloquent oratory ever voiced is that upon praying lips. Dying Stephen while praying for his enemies was granted a vision of Jesus standing at the right hand of God, in the open heavens. Realizing the efficacy of the sacred trust, Jesus set his disciples example in its keeping by his visit to mountain fastness and lonely Gethsemane to obtain help in his great trials in life. Schools may teach men how to preach, but heaven alone can teach us how to pray. The best manual on prayer is the Bible. In scriptural prayer there should be adoration. The great prayers of the prophets contain the highest ascriptions to Jehovah and the disciples prayer begins: "Our Father which art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name." The Father may answer, "No," to our prayers when we expect "yes," but he always answers

best, if we ask His will to be done. There must be confession of sin. Isaiah says, "Your iniquities have separated between you and your God and your sins have hid His face from you; that He will not hear." The Father expects us to confess our sins to Him and not in the ears of men. There must be a spirit of forgiveness and if possible restitution. The model prayer says, "Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors." If we hold a grudge against our brother, our prayer will have little power with God. Our prayers must bear the mark of thanksgiving and persistence. Paul says, "Continue in prayer and watch in the same with thanksgiving," while Luke, the eleventh chapter, teaches that if we ask, seek and knock the Father will hear. Secret prayer such as Jesus taught his disciples has many advantages. He would not have them make their public prayers a test of piety. The closet prayer is a condition of knowledge. Here self-examination is more favorable for the revelation of God to the soul. Secret prayer is more sympathetic than public prayer, for as we shut the world out we have a better opportunity to be alone with God. Secret prayer has greater leverage with God. The sound-proof box of the telephone brings me the voice of my friend and when we enter the closet shutting out the world God seems so near that we are strengthened. The secret trust is a condition of soul enlargement. It widens life's sky line; it deepens life's experiences and it gives one for farther pilgrimage. Making our text our prayer, along life's pathway our hearts will burn within us because the Master will be by our side.

Educator Seeking a National University

BOULDER, Colo., Jan. 10.—A great national university, to be known as "The University of the United States," maintained by the government, and located at Washington, D. C., is the project toward which Dr. James H. Baker, former president of the University of Colorado, will devote his energies. Dr. Baker retired from the Colorado University after twenty years of continuous service, during which the school grew from an institution with sixty-seven students to a university with 1,500.

In an article just published, the educator outlines such an institution although he refuses to take credit for the idea. He says it is the result of conferences for several years between the members of the Association of State University Presidents, of which Dr. Baker has been president.

Besides becoming the greatest educational center in the country, with the best facilities and a research field equal to the German universities, Dr. Baker believes such an institution would become a mammoth laboratory where the problems of the nation should be studied and where proposed

reforms and new ideas should be put to the "acid test."

"A national university should represent profound scientific knowledge, its application to the practical needs of the country, the study of all economic, political and social problems, every phase of human betterment—in short, all that pertains to the welfare of a people," says Dr. Baker.

"In other words, there should be at the seat of government, complete opportunity for studying the vital problems of the nation. The plan, as it now appears, briefly is as follows: It is proposed to establish by act of congress the University of the United States; give it a board of trustees guarded from political bias; include all the scientific agencies at hand in the federal machinery at Washington and utilize all present resources."
