ing population has been maintained by a decreasing death rate; but in England and elsewhere the death rate must increase, being now so low on account of the age constitution of the population. It is only in Japan that the birth rate is increasing, although it still remains high in Russia. Five dreadnaughts built annually in England are fragile toys compared with five million children born annually in Russia.

Sealed proposals will be received by the police judge of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, until the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. of February 9, 1914, for the purchase of \$50,000.00 City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, general municipal registered coupon bonds of the denomination of \$1000.00 each, authorized at an election held November 24, 1913, for the construction of a city hall. Said bonds will bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, and be payable twenty years from date of issue. Interest payable semi-annual-
