CRAWFORD SEEKS TO BE GOVERNOR

ATOTNEY GENERAL COMES OUT
TO SECURE THE NOMINATION
AS A REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE
FOR CHIEF EXECUTIVE

PORTLAND, Jan. 12.—A. M. Crawford, attorney general, is a candidate for the republican nomination for governor. Mr. Crawford arrived in Portland to confer with friends as to platform pledges, and to outline a plan of action for the coming campaign. He expects soon to have his platform completed and ready for the voters to consider.

FARMERS TO BUILD ELECTRIC RAILWAY

NORTH DAKOTA RANCHERS WILL
TAKE TRANSPORTATION MAT-
TERS IN THEIR OWN HANDS
AND FINANCE ROAD

BEACH, N. D., Jan. 12.—At a meeting held here today, plans were materialized which will result in the construction of the first electric railway in the state to be financed and operated by farmers.

The line will run from Baker, Mont., through Dennie, N. D., Carlyle, Alpha, Williams to Beach. The proposition is meeting with enthusiastic endorsement throughout the entire community.

An agreement has been entered into whereby farmers within three miles of the road pay \$1 for every acre of land they own; those within five miles pay 75 cents per acre, and those within eight miles 50 cents an acre.

The subscriptions are to be void if the road is not in operation within a given period.

Frank has held the position of attorney general of Oregon. His present term expires next year, and instead of announcing himself to succeed himself, he has decided to try for governor.

Frank S. Grant, former city attorney for Portland, has announced himself as a candidate for the republican nomination for attorney general on learning of Crawford's decision.

Prior to being elected, Crawford practiced law in Roseburg. He has been a resident of this state for approximately thirty years.

As soon as his platform is completed Crawford will engage in an active and aggressive campaign, which will be carried on to the eve of the primaries. Repeatedly during the past year it has been rumored that Crawford wanted to be governor, but until he arrived in Portland he had declined to discuss the report.

Meat Situation Will Be Given Attention

(Herald Special Service)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 12.—The secretary of agriculture has announced the appointment of the following committee "to conduct a general inquiry into the various factors which have brought about the unsatisfactory conditions with respect to meat production in the United States, especially in reference to beef, with a view to suggesting possible methods for improvement."

Dr. B. T. Galloway, assistant secretary of agriculture, chairman; Dr. H. J. Rogers, president Kansas State Agricultural college; Professor C. F. Curtis, dean and director Iowa State college; Professor H. W. Mumford, professor of animal husbandry, University of Illinois; Dr. A. D. Melvin, chief of bureau of animal industry; Dr. T. N. Carver, director rural organization service.

The work of the committee will be centered largely on the study of economic questions involved in the production, transportation, slaughter and marketing of meat. As the first step the committee will investigate carefully the changes within the last two decades, which have increased the cost of production, and the centralizing of the meat industry.

Among the important considerations to be gone into will be the taking up of the public lands, the effect of the capacity of the range, especially on the remaining public lands and forest reserves, with a view to suggesting changes in the laws to make the public lands of greater use in cattle raising.

The committee will also give special attention to the economic changes in meat production and distribution brought about through the centralizing of slaughtering and meat preparations in large packing establishments, and the changes in transportation and

similar matters which have resulted from this centralization and other causes, the economic possibility of communal and community effort in cattle raising, and the advantages of establishing local or municipal abattoirs will also be investigated.

The committee will not deal specifically with questions of animal husbandry, which has to do with the actual breeding of cattle, as this work will be left to the specialists in the department and state agricultural colleges in this field.

The appointment of a committee will not interfere in any way with investigations now under way in any of the state agricultural colleges or experiment stations. The letter of appointment announces that the chairman within a short time will supply details regarding the scope of the investigation, and the lines of work which the committee might take up.
