

Liquor Question Will Go on Ballot in May

In addition to choosing a mayor, recorder, treasurer and councilman, the voter of Klamath Falls, at the May city election, will be asked to decide whether or not the saloons should continue. This was practically decided at a mass meeting held last night at Grace M. E. church.

Arthur R. Wilson, C. C. Hogue and Frank M. Upp were named to draft an ordinance, embodying this. Another committee was named to circulate an initiative petition, asking the placing of the question on the ballot. Members of this committee are E. M. Chilcote, Curtis E. Widdoes, Mrs. Frances Boyd, Miss Maude Carlton, O. A. Stearns, Arlie Worrell, Fred Hyndman, Mrs. L. B. Kinnear and J. B. Mason.

There were many women in attendance at last night's meeting, and several took a prominent part in the evening's program. It is more than possible that besides the wet and dry ticket, the prohibitionists will place a ticket in the field at the coming election.

State Treasurer Is Supported by Court

SALEM, Jan. 13.—The employment of State Senator Claude McColloch by State Corporation Commissioner Watson as a legal assistant to the corporation department was not legal, and State Treasurer Tom Kay acted properly in refusing to pay McColloch's salary warrant, according to a decision handed down today by the supreme court.

The court held that the attorney general and the district attorneys were the proper officers to give legal assistance to the state officials.

Chocolate to Be Taken From the Soldier Diet

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 13.—In spite of the fact that chocolate is easily carried and one of the few articles of diet which will "keep" almost indefinitely, Secretary of War Garrison has ordered its abolishment as an army ration.

The reason assigned for this action is a report made by Dr. C. F. Longworthy, of the department of agriculture, who declared that the army chocolate is "defective as to digestibility." Soldiers have come to regard

this food as the greatest and best standby when under arms in the field, when rations may be short.

Nothing of equal nutritious value which may be carried as easily has yet been discovered by the expert who reported unfavorably on chocolate, but experiments are being made in an effort to find some substitute for it, which possesses all of the advantages of chocolate, yet will not be "deleterious to the health of the consumers," which chocolate is, according to the report.

Governor Is Still Silent

Women Are Hopeful of Saving Murderess's Life



Will Mrs. Nellie Wakefield, convicted of the murder of her husband, pay the death penalty, or will the appeal of women from all parts of Connecticut save her?

This is a question that is still unsolved at Hartford. It will remain unsolved, too, until Governor Simeon Baldwin makes some announcement. Governor Baldwin has received numberless petitions, many from other states, asking him to commute the death sentence. So far, no woman has been hanged in Connecticut.

Although no announcement has been made by the governor, those seeking to save the woman's life have not given up hope. The date of execution has been set for March 4, and they hope to secure a commutation by that time.

Mrs. Wakefield is the mother of several children. The testimony, largely circumstantial, tended to prove that she and a man beat her husband to death in a tract of timber.
