WOMAN LONGER LIVED THAN MAN

COMPILATIONS OF THE CENSUS BUREAU SHOW THAT MORE WOMEN THAN MEN REACH THE EIGHTIETH YEAR

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 15.—That white women live to and die at more advanced ages than white men is proved by figures published today by the department of commerce.

Until the age of 80 years more deaths of male members of the race are recorded. This is accounted for by the fact that there are more men than women.

Conceding that numbers of sexes are about even at the age of 70, a great number of the surviving men die during the next decade, after which the mortality rate for women leads.

There were 780 women over 95 years old who died during the year 1910, and only 534 men of the same age died; 246 people over 100 years old died during the year, and of this number 149 were women. These figures would seem to prove that the older women die faster than men, hence the greater mortality figures in the advanced ages.

About the same proportions hold good among the colored races in this country—negroes, Mongolians, Malays and Indians. Although comprising about only 1-17 of the population of the country, a more than proportionate number of deaths occur at advanced ages, 126 living to be over 100 years old. Of this number 93 were women and 33 men.

These seeds represent more than a quarter of a century of work by Luther Burbank. If lost or destroyed they could not be duplicated, at any rate for years, and it was to guard against this that the Luther Burbank company recently stored them in the strong room of the Union

New Member of Parliament Buys Historic Buildings



London has just had the sensation

of discovering a new multi-millionaire, Harry Mallaby-Deeley, a member of parliament, who was known to be a real estate operator, but never suspected of handling millions. Not until he bought nineteen acres in the heart of London for \$15,000,000, property including the famous Covent Garden, Drury Lane theater, Waldorf Hotel, Bow Street Police court, Aldwych theater, Strand theater and the National Sporting Club, did they begin to wonder who he was. It was suggested that Mr. Mallaby-Deeley had a syndicate behind him. This he has denied, saying that he himself has bought the estate for investment.

Mr. Mallaby-Deeley was not a merchant prince or a captain of industry or a great financier, to whom a transaction might be regarded as an ordinary investment. Though the popular impression may be quite wrong, it has never credited Mr. Mallaby-Deeley with the possession of great wealth.

One seed is a new kind of flax, from the oil of which artists will make their paint. Another is a cereal known as quino, to take the place of wheat, barley or oats.

Painters have long complained that the oil with which their paints are mixed is not neutral, because of the variability of the flaxseed from which it is made and consequently that it often gives unexpected and sometimes unsatisfactory effects.

Burbank began gathering every kind of flax from all parts of the world years ago, selected a certain seed as his ideal, and began developing the plant to grow only this type. Year after year the seed was planted, and when it was ripe only those were kept that were of the type desired. Finally a point has been reached where the variety seems to have become fixed. Burbank declares that the oil it produces is absolutely neutral.

The quino plant is designed to

take the place of cereal foods made from different grains. The seed resembles a small hominy, and the plant looks like a wild mustard. It is claimed to have all the food values of other grains, and is much cheaper. Moreover, in making cracked wheat, rolled oats or barley, much of the grain is wasted. The entire seed of the new plant is utilized. Originally it came from South America, but its development and climatic adaptation to California soil and weather conditions have taken years of study and experiment. Of the quino seeds of the type Burbank has produced there is not a peck in the world.

"We have put the seeds in safe deposit vaults," said President James R. Edwards of the Luther Burbank company, "because if they are destroyed they would never be reproduced. There are no more like them, and I doubt if Burbank would live long enough to develop them again. It will be several years before we shall be able to raise a sufficient quantity of either seed to be placed upon the market."
