IS CHOOSING EASTER ISLE HUBBIES

British Army Officer Is Faithfully Fulfilling Commission From Hundred Maidens

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 16.—Major Frank Pooley, British army officer, retired, is the busiest man in San Francisco. One hundred dusky beauties of Easter Island in the South Sea want as many white men for husbands and Major Pooley is here today to get them and arrange for their transportation.

"Men of the desirable kind," said Major Pooley in an advertisement inserted in a San Francisco newspaper, "are scarce in Easter Island. The women outnumber the men three to one. The women want husbands and I am here to get them. I represent one hundred of the best looking women on the island. They are wealthy. Their husbands will not have to work. They will live in ease and comfort for the rest of their days."

The next day more than five hundred men appeared at Major Pooley's headquarters in the Alaska-Pacific Steamship Company's office to qualify as South Sea bridegrooms. It was estimated today that more than 5,000 white men have volunteered since the advertisement was first inserted.

Some of the would-be husbands are fat. Others are lean. Dozens are short and others are tall. A youth of nineteen, weighing about ninety pounds, was anxious to know if the Easter Island beauties are slight and slender creatures. He nearly wept when told that the average weight was not less than 175 pounds. Hundreds of letters from other applicants have been received by Major Pooley. One signed A. Tenner and A. Mossom, read:

"We are both young and handsome, but we are too lazy to work." Another signed John Hunter read: "I am the very finest specimen of manhood to be found in the United States. I am 33 years old, six feet one inch tall, and weigh 290 pounds. I know I can lie around all day and be contented. Just give me the proper instruction and I'll soon be on my way."

Major Pooley is a particular person and is determined that only the best types of men shall go to the South Seas. Out of the hundreds who have applied, only forty names were placed among the possibilities. "I shall take about a week longer

for this registration," said Major Pooley. "By that time I expect to have the names of 300 physically perfect men. Two-thirds of these will then be eliminated in the final selection. I have the money furnished by the women to pay all transportation. The men accepted will travel first-class."

Two Water Permits Go to Klamath County Men

(Herald Special Service)

SALEM, Jan. 16.—For the year 1913 a total of 456 permits were issued by the state engineer for the appropriation of water. Under these permits 442,181 acres will be irrigated, 29,225 horsepower will be developed and 41 reservoirs constructed at a total cost of approximately \$7,000,000.

During the quarter ending December 31, 1913, 88 permits were issued for the irrigation of 6,933 acres and the development of 1,958 horsepower. Among these permits was one issued to F. D. Small of Tillamook and D. C. Urie of Camas, Wash., for the development of 1,308 horsepower with the waters of the Trask river in Tillamook county.

The following are permits issued in Klamath county the past quarter: J. L. Frost of Klamath Falls has a permit to irrigate 20 acres, diverting the waters from a spring which is located in sec. 20, tp. 37 S., R. 11 W. E. W. C. Dalton of Malin has a permit to store 1450 acre feet of the waters of Mills Creek, which is located in tp. 40 S., R. 12 E., and also has a permit to apply the stored waters to the irrigation of 643 acres of land.

Klamath Falls, Oregon, until the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. of February 9, 1914, for the purchase of \$50,000.00 City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, general municipal registered coupon bonds of the denomination of \$1000.00 each, authorized at an election held November 24, 1913, for the construction of a city hall. Said bonds will bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, and be payable twenty years from date of issue. Interest payable semi-annually. Both principal and interest payable at the fiscal agency of the state of Oregon, in the city of New York.

Proposals to purchase said bonds must be accompanied by a certified check, certified by some recognized responsible bank, payable to the police judge of said city, for an amount equal to five per cent of the amount bid. Said bonds will be sold for cash paid down at time of delivery and for not less than par and accrued interest.

Said bonds to be dated April 1, 1914. The city of Klamath Falls reserves the right to reject any and all proposals. Said bonds are issued and disposed of under the charter of the city of Klamath Falls. Proposals to purchase said bonds will be open and considered by the common council at the council chamber in the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, corner Main and Second streets, on the 9th day of February, 1914.

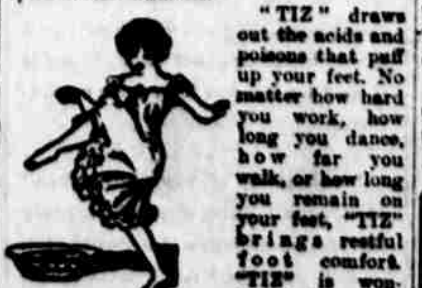
