

Grafting an Arm On Patient Latest Feat

BERLIN, Jan. 16.—Surgeons all over Germany today are watching with intense interest the case of Marie Kuback, who recently underwent a remarkable operation in a hospital at Prague.

The patient, a dressmaker, was suffering from a disease of the upper arm, which necessitated amputation. Just before the operation another girl, who had attempted suicide, died in the hospital, and the doctors decided to try a grafting experiment. Removing the bone from the upper arm of Miss Kuback, they inserted in its place a section from the arm of the dead girl.

The operation was successful far beyond the doctors' fondest hopes, and latest reports from the hospital say the patient is steadily improving.

DATA REGARDING ELECTION GIVEN

PRIMARIES MAY 15TH, GENERAL ELECTION IN NOVEMBER. MUST FILE PETITIONS BY THE FIFTEENTH OF APRIL

The following is a syllabus of election matters for the coming year:

January 5—Opening of registration.

May 1—Last day to register for

primary election.

April 15—Last day to file petitions for nominations for county and district offices.

May 15—Primary election (polls open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m.).

May 30—Last day for candidates to file statement of expenses. All candidates must file their declaration before circulating their petitions, and all candidates elected must file their acceptance with certificate of nomination.

May 20—Opening of registration books.

September 25—Last day to file certificate of nomination by political party or assembly for county and district.

October 9—Last day to file certificate of nomination by individual

electors for county, district or precinct.

October 15—Last day to file petition for local option election.

October 18—Last day to register.

November 3—General election (polls open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m.).

November 18—Last day for candidates to file statement of expenditures.

All candidates must file their acceptance with certificate of nomination.

All nominating petitions and notices pertaining to candidates for the office of delegate to a party national convention, elector of president or vice-president of the United States, United States senator in congress, representative in congress, governor, secretary of state, state treasurer, justice

of the supreme court, attorney-general, superintendent of public instruction, state printer, state engineer, dairy and food commissioner, commissioner of the bureau of labor statistics and inspector of factories and workshops, commissioner of the railroad commission of Oregon, superintendent of a water division, judge of the circuit court, district or prosecuting attorney, state senator or representative in legislative assembly, or other office to be voted for in the state at large, or in a district composed of one or more counties, shall be filed with the secretary of state not less than 35 days before the primary election.
