

Tango and Wind Dance Under Ban in Saxony

DRESDEN, Jan. 20.—Supposedly on orders direct from King Frederick August, a fierce war against modern types of dancing is being waged by the police and local administrative authorities throughout Saxony. In the past of Grimma, Wursen and Cuhita lists have been issued of six different varieties which are prohibited under severe penalties, among them the "Saxon tango," the "wind dance" and the "bow dance."

Another regulation requiring proprietors of public dance halls henceforth to act as censors or morals and

propriety, punishment for infractions to be visited upon them as well as upon their patrons.

The police at Meissen, famous for its porcelain, recently closed a dance hall for permitting the "Dresden shepherdess dance soiree," after the participants had vainly protested that all their gyrations were copied from designs by artists in the royal porcelain works.

"Bagman" Pleads Guilty in N. Y. Court



Arthur A. McLean, long treasurer of the Democratic state committee of New York and close friend of Charles F. Murphy, boss of Tammany, and till recently democratic leader in the state, has pleaded guilty in court to the charge of receiving campaign contributions from contractors on state work. As treasurer of the committee he received contributions from companies engaged in construction work for the state in violation of an act passed a few years ago. This was the first definite result of an investigation into grafting in connection with contractors on state roads and the Erie canal. Other men have been indicted and will be tried later.

Since District Attorney Whitman, who prosecuted the case, believed that McLean had no criminal intent, but merely followed a long-established policy of his committee, he consented to a suspension of sentence rather than fine and imprisonment.

"American Radium for Americans," Says Secretary

This Is the Policy to Be Followed by Lane. Once Extracted, Is Available to Use for Generations

Secretary Lane of the interior department expresses himself in no uncertain terms in his belief that the American people will strongly support him in the broad gauge policy that aims to extract from lands now in public ownership sufficient American radium for American hospitals, in order that the poorest patients may secure promptly the treatment now necessarily limited to the selected few.

In a reply to a protest against the proposed legislation allowing the withdrawal of public lands known or believed to contain radium ores, Secretary Lane states the issue as one which is believed to be that of life and death to hundreds of thousands of Americans.

The apprehension seems to be, the secretary states, that vast areas in "any part" of Colorado are to be closed to entry "on suspicion," and thus prospecting not only for radium but for the precious and semi-precious metals as well will be stopped. These fears are not well founded. The distribution of radium-bearing minerals as now known in Colorado is fairly well defined, and there is no intention in the interior department to apply withdrawals outside of the relatively small areas known to contain these minerals.

The pitchblende of Gilpin county is already owned entirely by individuals and corporations, and a single American company now controls more than 100 carnotite claims, the radium product from which will be sold to the highest bidder in any country. The carnotite deposits which it is now proposed to devote primarily to the use of the American people are known through investigations of the United States geological survey to be for the most part confined to particular beds of rock.

The official statistics of 1913 as to our exports of uranium and vanadium ores carrying radium, indicate a larger content of radium in the Colorado ores shipped to Europe than in the somewhat greater tonnage of ores treated or kept in this country. The joint resolution submitted by the secretary for the consideration of congress contains authority not only for the president to withdraw radium lands from further private appropriation, but also for the secretary of the interior to lease these lands or other-

wise provide for the mining of the ores so as to secure the needed supply for the government and hospitals of the United States. The vigorous administration which such a law would deserve by reason of the urgent nature of the matter would demand that there be no delay in opening the deposits to purposeful utilization.

The object of the proposed legislation is not reservation from use, but rather development under conditions not only favoring but even forcing the best use of this valuable resource, which has no value except as it is mined and used.

The effort of the federal government should be, and Secretary Lane states that he believes that it will be directed to the promotion of all min-

which need not be feared. The radium once extracted from the ores becomes available for continued use without appreciable loss, and becomes a permanent addition to the needed supply. The same radium that is placed at humanity's service today may be used by our children for many generations.

Whatever the percentage of American ores now exported from mines in private ownership and largely under corporate control, it is, in Secretary Lane's opinion, only equitable and humane to assure America preferential rights to the radium on land still in public ownership. It is for control to this end that the legislation is proposed and such control is to be secured through the immediate opening of mines and the prompt extraction of the radium from the ores mined.

Resolutions were passed at the international miners' congress in favor of a maximum working day of eight hours for all miners, of an obligatory rest of sixteen hours between shifts, and of a maximum day of six hours for those who work in hot or wet places.

A committee of mining men is arranging a mining exhibition in Vancouver for 1915. Exhibits showing the old-time methods compared with the modern methods will be a feature. A large attendance is expected, owing to the crowds coming to the Pacific coast for the Panama exposition.
