A Short Course for Painters in Iowa

AMES, Iowa, Jan. 21.—While many states have "short courses" of instruction for the benefit of farmers, fruit growers and stock raisers, and even housewives, in connection with the educational scheme of state colleges, Iowa has broken the ice in the way of industrial education by organizing the first short course for painters and decorators held in connection with the state convention of union painters and decorators.

The engineering college has charge of the work, and the first session had 150 painters and decorators from all

over the state in attendance. It was expected that the short course for other trades will be a feature in the future, and is likely to spread to other states.

Tradesmen and manufacturers in Massachusetts, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Illinois and Wisconsin are investigating the idea, with a view of organizing similar courses in their state colleges.

With the passing of the apprentice system of education, the short course under the state auspices is thought to be the next step toward education of mechanics in many lines.

Standard Receptacles for Poisons Are Asked

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—Resolutions seeking from the legislatures of all states laws requiring drug manufacturers and wholesale and retail druggists to adopt a special form of receptacle for bi-chloride of mercury, today were presented at the sessions of the New York State Pharmaceutical Association.

In connection with the resolutions presented, the attention of delegates and visitors was called to the exhibit of patent bottles, boxes and capsules designed to hold bi-chloride of mer-

cury and other poisonous drugs and medicines.

Standard shapes of receptacles, boxes and capsules for the various poisons and drugs, it was argued, would do away almost entirely with accidental deaths by these poisons.

There was every indication today that the resolutions would be adopted and the officials of the association ordered to send the resolutions to the legislatures of all the states in the Union.

Notice Inviting Proposals to purchase City of Klamath Falls Registered General Municipal Coupon Bonds.

Sealed proposals will be received by the police judge of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, until the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. of February 9, 1914, for the purchase of \$50,000.00 City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, general municipal registered coupon bonds of the denomination of \$1000.00 each, authorized at an election held November 24, 1913, for the construction of a city hall. Said bonds will bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, and be payable twenty years from date of issue. Interest payable semi-annually. Both principal and interest payable at the fiscal agency of the state of Oregon, in the city of New York.

Proposals to purchase said bonds must be accompanied by a certified check, certified by some recognized responsible bank, payable to the police judge of said city, for an amount equal to five per cent of the amount bid.
