IS GIVEN MEDAL AFTER 42 YEARS

TARDY RECOGNITION IS ACCORD-
ED VETERAN, WHO, WITH A
FEW COMPANIONS, SAVED THE
FLAG FROM THE ENEMY

ST. MARYS, Pa., Jan. 22.—For his
part in one of the bravest acts of the
Franco-Prussian war, Charles Chag-
not of St. Marys has just received
recognition from the French govern-
ment. And today he was proudly ex-
hibiting a handsome bronze medal,
pendant on a green and black striped
ribbon.

It was forty-two years ago, and one
of the hottest battles of the long con-
flict, that Chagnot and sixteen com-
rades distinguished themselves. The
Prussians had captured their banner,
and they made a successful rally and
retrieved it, Chagnot and thirteen of
them returning to the ranks alive.

The record of their deed was en-
tered, but it was only last March that
the French war department rewarded
the old soldiers.

Says German Police Dogs Are a Failure

BERLIN, Jan. 23.—That the fam-
ous German "police dogs" are a fail-
ure of tracking and capturing of
criminals and that their services have
been much overrated, is the report of
Lieutenant of Police Most, director
of the police dog breeding and train-
ing station near Strausberg.

Lieutenant Most's testimony is cor-
roborated by Dr. Zell, director of the
Zoological Garden in Berlin. Both
declare that the police dogs are of
little value in police work in the big
cities. Fifty tests made at the in-
stance of the ministry of the interior
proved that the dogs held the trail
of the quarry in but a comparatively
small number of cases.

Uncle Sam Pays \$6000 a Year for Dog Fodder

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 23.—
Uncle Sam had to pay \$5,256.26 for
dog food in the fiscal year ending
June 30, 1913.

This, and many other unique fea-
tures are contained in the first report
of the chief of the quartermaster's
corps of the army, announced today.

According to the report, moonlight
will save Uncle Sam just \$25,000 in
1914, if the estimates do not go
astray, since it is proposed that all

electric lights at the army posts shall
be turned out when the moon is shin-
ing. So that the militia will not
starve should it be called out for
war and no cooks should be found
among its ranks, a school for cooks is
suggested at Fort Sam Houston, with
a capacity of thirty pupils at a time.
The quartermaster corps supplants
the offices of the quartermaster gen-
eral, the commissary general and the
paymaster general, effecting a saving
of 40 officers and \$23 men.

Congressmen Can Wait to Pay Income Taxes

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 23.—
Although they themselves are respon-
sible for the new income tax law, un-
der which taxes are assessed begin-
ning March 1, 1913, senators and rep-
resentatives are jubilant today over a
ruling which exempts them from hav-
ing their salaries taxed before next
May at least. While most folks sub-

ject to the tax are "ponying up" for
the ten months of 1913 and all of this
year, the congressmen are immune
under the new law for months to
come. Bachelors of congress will be
hit first by the new tax. They will
have one per cent deducted from
their salaries on May 4th. Married
congressmen will have the tax taken
from their salaries on July 4th.

A treasury department ruling upon
the income tax is responsible for the
apparent favoritism shown congress-
men under the new law. Although
the tax went into effect last March,
the treasury department ordered that
one per cent be deducted "at the
source"—the senate and the house
sergeant at arms, who pay congress-
men's salaries—only upon payments
in excess of \$3,000 during last No-
vember and December. As congress-
men are paid their \$7,500 salaries in
monthly installments of \$625 upon
the fourth day of each month, this
treasury department order resulted in
escape of the income tax by all con-
gressmen, who received \$1,250 on the
two paydays in November and De-
cember.

Now the sergeants at arms rule
that they cannot deduct the income
tax from Congressional salaries until
after each congressman has been paid
\$3,000 or more. This is because of
contingencies that a member might
die or resign, and thus not have an in-
come of over \$3,000 before the pay-
day on May 4th, when members will
have received five checks for \$625
each for the five months of 1914.
